It is clear also that an attack upon Turkey would be 'the signal for a general European war of the most formidable proportions. If Great Britain, France, Germany and Austria would but intimate to the Czar that they were united in feeling and would be united in action on such an occasion, the fear would be at an end. But it is unfortunately difficult to secure such co-operation even among civilized powers. Yet there are especial requirements which should cause the great | Prior's. powers to unite in preventing Russia from raising outside wars whenever her internal troubles are too great for the Czer to deal
