MARA COUNCIL.

Council met this 11th day of March, 1882,
 in the Town Hall Mara. Members all pre-
 sent—the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of
 last meeting read and confirmed. The
 clerk read communication from F. Madill,
 M. P. P., acknowledging receipt of memorial
 to Attorney-General. From Jas. Grigg, jr.,
 praying the council to set off another polling
 sub-division for the convenience of electors
 in the north-east portion of the township.
 From W. F. O'Royle, re-improvement of 7th
 con. line and other roads near and on his
 property. By-law passed appointing muni-
 cipal officers—C. E. Hewitt, Collector, \$80,
 Jno. Fox, Treasurer, \$80; Michael McGrath,
 Assessor, \$90; W. K. McPhee, Clerk,
 \$340. Messrs. Bruce, Thomson and Deputy-
 Reeve were appointed a road and bridge
 committee. Mr. O'Leary gave notice that
 he would at the next meeting of council in-
 troduce a by-law to readjust polling sub-
 divisions in the township. On motion of
 Mr. Sullivan, seconded by Mr. Thomson,
 the following changes were made in Road
 Divisions.—W. hf. N. hf. 19, con. 13; N.
 hf. 20, con. 13; S. hf. 20, con. 13; S. qr.
 22, con. 13, and N. hf. 22, con. 13, be taken
 from division where they now are and formed
 into new division No. 554 with John Harris
 pathmaster. E. hf. 30, con. 10 and S. hf.
 30, con. 11, be taken from No. 38 and added
 to No. 39. N. hf. 27, 28, 29 and 30, con.
 11, be added to No. 38. That James E.
 Elder be allowed to work as far south on
 Fair Valley road as the 11th con. line. The
 Reeve was authorized to remove Jno. Fer-
 guson to General Hospital, or a place where
 he would receive proper care. Cheques
 were granted as follows.—Messrs. McRae,
 O'Leary and Sullivan, for expenses and
 time going to Toronto, re-new county, \$12
 each; Timothy O'Leary to pay men for
 work, con. 7, \$17; John Lytle, repairing
 road scrapers, \$4; Luke Doble, do., \$1.25;
 Hale & Bros., advertising Court of Revision,
 printing ballot papers and auditors' report,
 \$38.32; Wm. Boulton, refund dog tax, \$1;
 Hugh McDermott, repairing culvert, con.
 11, between lots 20 and 21, \$3; Jas. Cleary,
 refund dog tax, \$1; Mrs. McDonald, indig-
 ent, \$5. Council adjourned until the
 second Saturday in April.

Council met this 20th day of March, 1882.
 Members present, Messrs. Parkinson, Broad,
 Lowndsbrough and Bowes. Absent, Mr.
 Adam. Minutes of last meeting read and
 approved. Resolved, that the tender for
 printing from C. D. Barr be accepted, being
 the lowest. Resolved that, the amount
 charged for statute labor against the South
 half 22 and part 23, 1st Con., and returned
 to the County Treasurer be struck off, and
 the amount charged to this Township. Re-
 solved, that the following grants be made
 to indigent persons: J. Edwards, \$3.00;
 Blew's family in care of A. Cameron, \$4.00;
 Z. Jewell, in care of J. F. Cameron, \$20.00;
 J. Davey for wood supplied to Mrs. Morin,
 \$3.00, and the grant of \$8.00 per qr. now
 being paid to Mr. and Mrs. Yeo be increased
 to \$10.00 per quarter. Resolved, that ap-
 plication having been made to have the N.
 half 17, Con. 14, and S. hf. 17, Con. 15,
 taken from School Section No. 5 and an-
 nexed to School Section No. 16; the Clerk
 is hereby requested to notify the trustees
 of said sections that the same will be taken
 into consideration at the next meeting of
 Council. Resolved, that By-law No. 281
 being a By-law to appoint certain officers in
 the Township of Mariposa for the year 1882,
 be received and read a first time. By-law
 No. 281 after passing through committee
 was read a third time and finally passed.
 Resolved, that the Auditors' Report for the
 year 1881 be received and adopted. Re-
 solved, that the Reeve give his order on the
 Treasurer in favor of James Dickson, Esq.,
 P. L. S., for the sum of \$50.00, being
 balance due for work done under Drainage
 By-law No. 240. Council adjourned to meet
 again on the third Monday in April next.
