THE income of the Manchester Unity, I O. O. F., of England, for the past year, in American value, was about \$4,085,000, and the relief and expenses about \$2,855,000. THE aged monarch, William of Prussia, hangs tenaciously to the "Divine right of Kings." Addressing adeputation recently, he said :- "He considered it necessary to again remind the country what the Crown in Prussia was. It was a symbol of the absolute authority given by God and not to be taken away by man."—With these senti-ments King William is gathering together a desperate policy for his successor to maintain, as it is quite evident that the people of Germany are not disposed to accept this theory quite passively.

THE curse the Jews took upon themselves nearly nineteen hundred years ago still follows them with unrelenting fury. The Russian government has [passed a decree that all Jews in the rural districts are to leave at once, thereby causing over a million of the poor unfortunates to seek refuge in the large cities or distant lands. The Russian government give as an excuse that this is the only course open to them to prevent the outrages perpetrated upon the unoffending race in the outstanding districts, Russia is never particular as to the means she uses when it is necessary to stir up public feeling among the people.

A PROJECT has been broached for an all rail route to Europe. The plan is a big one. The route is difficult, but not impossible. The way lies over the Canadian Pacific railway, up the west coast of British America, through Alaska to Cape Prince of Wales. Here pessengers are to be transferred by steamer to East Cape in Asia. Thence a road will be run through Siberia to connect with the present Siberian and Russian railway system. From Moscow, the traveller can reach any part of Europe. Snow might impede this route in winter, but in summer the trip would be exceedingly pleasant. Such a road may become of the possibilities of the future.

MR. PAGE, of California, has the itemized bills for the Garfield expenditures as far as they relate to the House of Representatives or its members, and whenever the House calls for those bills he will no doubt be happy to lay them before it. Besides the item for \$1,700 for champagne, brandy, whiskey, cigars, and lunch, and \$300 for cocktails, there is another, it is reported, of \$1,200 for white gloves. Certain ice men, who had been charging the general public \$3, for ice farnished to cool the White House charged at the rate of \$5, with extra claims for carts and help. Persons who ran in unasked to give advice as to the best way to cool the White House, and whose advice was not taken, have sent in bills for their trouble. Some of the personal bills of expenses made out by members of the House in connection with the funeral are said to be of an extraordinary character.

THE Brock Council have passed a by-law to regulate the burning of brush, stumpe, etc. It provides that no stumps, wood, logs, trees, brush, straw, shavings or refuse shall be set on fire or burned by any person or persons in the open air within the municipality, in or during the months of July and August in any year; nor at any other time or itimes during the year until after eight days' notice has been given to the owner or occupant of the adjoining property. Any person contravening the sprovisions of this by-law shall, in addition to any damages which may occur be liable to a fine not less than two dollars nor more than tifty dollars, upon conviction before a Justice of the Peace.—This is a judicious measure and one that our own township fatners would do well to follow. A MONTREAL gentleman who has himself made an Arctic voyage, states that Commander Cheyne is in Ottawa pushing his scheme for reaching the North Pole by baloon, the only obstacle in the way being the want of money, of which about \$100,000 will be required. He has fully decided upon the route he will take; the chief difficulty will be to reach his camp grounds or the point from which his baloon will start. This point will be only 450 miles from the Pole and will be in Davis Straits at the northeast corner of Grinnell Land, near by Cape Urion, opposite Greenland on the west side of Smith's Sound. Having reached this point he will project encampments for a considerable distance apart, north of Cape Urion toward the pole, in order to find out courses of the winds, as he presumes there will be currents going northward at times and southward at other times; and if so, he will take advantage of letting go his baloons on the northward course toward the pole which he expects to reach in twentyfour hours from starting from his main camp. The gas for his baloons may bo made on the spot, and will be of pure hydro-gen, it being lighter than carburetted hydrogen. He contemplates being able to keep the baloons at a certain altitude by means of a long rope being trailed on the ice ; because, as the baloons ascend, more weight of rope will be brought to bear upon them and vice versa as the baloons descend less weight. The baloons will be very perfectly constructif there should be an unforeseen escape, he proposes to take the gas of one baloon and put it into the others and then avail himself of the returning winds.
