The poet, Longfellow, died at Boston on Friday last.

The respite granted by the Nihilists to the Czar, who is leading a most miserable life in his palace-prison at Gatchina, is only temporary and conditional.

The Brook Council have passed a by-law to regulate the burning of brush, stumps, etc. It provides that no stumps, wood, logs, trees, brush, straw, shavings or refuse shall be set on fire or burned by any person or persons in the open air within the municipality, in or during the months of July and August in any year; nor at any other time or times during the year until after eight days' notice has been given to the owner or occupant of the adjoining property.
