Dastardly Attempt to Blow up the British House of Commons.

A SUPPOSED FENIAN PLOT.

Attempted Assassination of Lady Florence Dixie.

The Irish troubles, assuming recent events to be in connection with them, are producing a wide-spread feeling of consternation in England. On Thursday night of last week a desperate attempt to blow up the House of Commons and the offices of the London Times was made. Press despatches give the following accounts:—

London, March 16.—What was thought to have been a terrific gas explosion occurred in the Local Government Board offices in Westminster at 9 o'clock last night, destroying much property. The report was heard in the House of Commons and caused great alarm.

The concussion was so great that it shook the side galleries and the reporters' gallery. It being at dinner hour, but few members of the House were in the hall. The Duke of Edinburgh was in the peers' gallery and seemed much alarmed. The speaker forthwith rang the bell and asked the cause of the alarm. There was no one injured. The wildest rumors are afloat. The report resembled the discharge of an 80 ton gun.

It is now believed that the explosion was caused by dynamite, and that a deliberate attempt was made to blow up the government offices.

LATER DETAILS.

London, March 16.—The explosion being the subject of consideration in the House of Commons, Sir W. Harcourt said that he did not think it would be right to say anything about the matter until an official enquiry had been made. He had heard that an attempt had been made to blow up the Times office, but that no injury had been done.

London, March 15.—The explosion was heard for two or three miles. Yesterday evening a canister containing explosive material was found behind the Times office, with it is rumored, a lighted fuse attached. The police are investigating. The officials think the explosion was caused by gunpowder or dynamite. The officers of the Gas Company declare they can find no evidence that it was caused by gas. The force of the explosion shot large portions of masonry across the street. The explosion was undoubtedly the work of Fenians. The adjacent streets are filled with myriads of fragments of glass, and heavy plate glass is lying in heaps on the ground. A stone weighing two hundred pounds was projected against King street police station, making a hole the size of a man's head. Nothing will be allowed to be touched until the enquiry is made to-morrow. The full extent of the damage cannot be estimated till day light. Two hundred constables are guarding the scene. The building has the appearance of having been bombarded. There is a deep trench, ten feet by three, in one room floor, which has been literally ploughed.

Two children, sleeping in a house on the corner of King street, were thrown from their beds by the explosion and had their faces badly cut. They were rescued and taken to the police station. Every pane of glass in the vicinity is shattered. A man was arrested at midnight on suspicion of being concerned in the explosion.

Sir W. Harcourt has had a conference with the Chief of Police, at which several witnesses were examined. The conclusion reached was that the explosion occurred in the inside room, and not from outside the building. After the explosion the force of Police at the House of Parliament was doubled.

The Government offices and the residences of the ministers are strongly guarded. The Times attaches but little importance to the explosion which occurred at its office. The canister contained only a small quantity of powder. The News says it is obvious that the explosion was the result of premeditated design. We are confronted with the fact that there are in London persons bold enough to act on the wildest and most desperate schemes.

London, March 16.—Every part of Westminster, the Abbey, the House of Parliament, the great structures of public offices, clubs, and dwelling houses, were violently shaken by the explosion last night. The destruction was followed by the crash of glass falling from thousands of windows. That Charles street is unfringed at night partly explains the extraordinary fact that no lives were lost. It is stated that dynamite was placed on the window sill, inside the balustrade, where the fuse when burning could be concealed from the view of the persons passing. The great stone balustrade was obliterated. The massive masonry sent back fragments of the pavement, shattered and ground to powder. A wooden structure opposite was blown into splinters. Inside the government offices there remained nothing but splintered wood, broken plaster, and walls burst asunder. The doors of the King street police station were burst in by a blast of air, and the detachment present was prostrated. Broken timbers and masses of stone were sent flying into King street, and numbers of people crossing at Parliament street were knocked down. A hansom and horse were flung across the sidewalk against the front of Whitehall Club, in which the great plate-glass windows were driven in a shower into the rooms. Everywhere the greatest commotion prevailed. People poured out of the houses with the broken glass cracking under their feet. In the House of Commons the alarm was general. Many members left immediately. The lobby was emptied, and people rushed out of Westminster Hall, while thousands flocked from all parts toward Westminster.

To further exasperate the English mind another atrocious crime was attempted on Saturday, when an effort was made to assassinate the famous Irishwoman, Lady Florence Dixie. The deed is the more despicable as Lady Florence has been one of Ireland's most vigorous champions and benefactors, both by pen and purse, during

the last few years. The attempted assassination is no doubt the outcome of a threat made by her to expose some of the manipulations of the Land League Funds. The following account is given of the affair:—

LONDON, MARCH 18.—Lady Florence Dixie was attacked at Windsor yesterday by two men disguised as women. Her dress was cut with daggers, but she received no injury. Lady Florence was walking in a secluded spot near the woods when two men asked her what time it was. She replied that she had no watch, and afterwards noticed, though they wore women's clothes, that their faces had been shaved. Much alarmed she started to walk away followed by the two men, one of whom seized her. She struggled to escape, but seeing their daggers fell into a swoon. This occurred at four p. m.; and she did not recover her senses until 4:45. Lady Florence has been prostrated to day. The story of the affair was elicited from her only at intervals. The saving of her life is attributed to her St. Bernard dog, which it is supposed protected her while she lay in a swoon. Lady Florence had no reason to suspect immediate danger, although she had been somewhat fearful since the receipt of letters about the Land League. The last thing she remembers is one of the men pushing a quantity of mud into her mouth. On her recovery she found both palms were cut across and her gloves severed. There were two dagger holes two inches apart in the right breast of her dress, and the broad steel corset rib was broken by the weapon, which penetrated to the inner lining of her dress at the first stroke and the corset at the second. Lady Florence supposes that she unconsciously struggled with the men, assisted by her dog until the scoundrels were disturbed by a cart passing in the woods. She received threatening letters while in Ireland lately. One of the men wore a green dress and a large hat with a veil. The veiled man attempted the assassination. No arrests have been made but the police have a slight clue. It is believed that the scoundrels were bitten by the dog in the struggle.

LATER.—Lady Florence Dixie says her head is confused and painful. She supposes the miscreants stunned her.
