OBITUARY.—Again it becomes our sad duty to chronicle another death in our village, Mrs. Angus McRae, who was confined about three weeks ago, and who had been ailing ever since that time, finally passed away to her long home on Saturday evening, aged 45 years. She leaves a large family, some of them being very young to mourn her untimely end. Her remains were interred in the R. C. burying ground at Brechin. Owing to the bad condition of the roads it was thought advisable to take the corpse to Brechin by train, which was accordingly done. Mr. McRae has the sympathy of the entire neighbourhood in the great loss he sustained.

RECOVERING.—James King Esq., of this village, who has been confined to his bed for the last six weeks with rheumatism, is improving considerably since spring has opened out. He is now able to move about through the village.

Mrs. Jos. Shields who has been very ill for the last few weeks is improving, though rather slowly. It is hoped she will soon be well again.

RETURNED.—The young men who left here in the fore part of winter to work in the lumber shanties have all returned. They all look well and which is better still they "feel well."

This and That.

Sir Samuel Baker says the war in the Sudan looks to the possession by England of cotton and corn fields that will render her independent of the United States so far as these productions are concerned. Sir Samuel, who has travelled through the now desert and undeveloped country of the Sudan, the population of which he estimates at 1,000,000 writes the Pall Mall Gazette that when this region passes into civilized hands it will be the richest on the whole continent. If the Sudan were in English hands, in a very few years England would be entirely independent of the United States both for cotton and corn.

During the year 1883 the number of acres of Crown lands sold in Ontario was 69,357

which realized \$69,503. Of Clergy lands, 3,233 acres were sold, for which \$3,907 were obtained. Of School lands, 447 acres were sold, realizing \$1,190. Grammar School lands, 862 acres, realizing \$884. The total collection of the Department for the year amounted to \$635,447, and the disbursements to \$253,325. Crown timber revenues during the same period to \$505,547. There was expended on Colonization Roads during the year the \$15,067.13. The number of locations made was 985, or 134,504 acres of land.
