A By-law to close up and sell a portion of the trespass road on lot 6 in the 11th concession of the Township of Thorah.

The Corporation of the Township of Thorah hereby enacts that from and No after the final passing of this By-law, all that portion of the trespass road on lot 6 in the 11th concession of the said Township of Thorah lying between the western limit of a deviation of the said crespass road (which said deviation is established and defined by By-law No. 4 of the year 1887 passed by the said Corporation of Thorah on the 1st day of | Jan. 18 October, A. D. 1887,) and the Talbot river-be and the same is hereby closed up and no longer to be used or considered a Public Highway of the said Township of Thorah.

And it is further enacted that the herein described portion of trespass road | May 14 so closed up, may be sold to the pro. Oct. prietor of the land lying adjacent to the same for the sum of twenty-five dollars provided that if the proprietor of the adjacent land shall not within the space of one year from the date of the final passing of this By-law, complete the purchase of the herein described portion of trespass road by accepting conveyance of the same and paying the price herein set forth, then, and in that case it may be lawful for the Corporation of Thorah to sell the same to any other person for twenty-five dollars or any greater sum.

And it is further enacted that the Reeve be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the Corporation to execute a conveyance, on the aforesaid terms, of the herein described portion of road and cause the Seal of the Corporation to be affixed thereto.



AUDITORS' REPORT.

We, the Auditors appointed to examine the Treasurer's books for the year 1887, beg herewith to submit our report for your consideration. We find that the sum of two hundred and nine dollars and ninety cents, (\$209.90) has been expended on the town line between Brock and Thorah and also seventy dollars and fifty-nine cents, (\$70.59) on the town line between Eldon and Thorah, but there is nothing to show that either Brock or Eldon has contributed an equivalent either in money or works. to counter-balance this outlay.
