Local Matters.

Fine April weather—sunshine and shower.

We are pleased to notice the holes in the sidewalk have been repaired and new boards put in.

The Eldon Branch Agricultural Society held a meeting last evening at the "Eldon House." Proceedings next week.

The first thunder storm of the season occurred on Sunday night last—thunder and lightning accompanied by a short but heavy rain.

Recovering.—Mrs. McDonald, of Kirkfield, the lady from whom Dr. McKay removed the tumor, last week, is rapidly recovering.

We understand Woodville cheese factory has been leased to a gentleman, a practical cheese maker, from Mount Albert, who is shortly to remove here with his family.

The Corporation Hogs are again on the war path and hard at work. Now our Police Trustees have got into working order it would be well for them to look after that wandering pork.

Mr. D. B. McNabb has gone to reside on his farm during the summer months. He has purchased some first-class short horn stock, for breeding purposes and has commenced, we think, in the right way to insure success.

The language of flowers is tender and beautiful; but it contains no satisfactory expression for the man who stubs his toe against a protruding nail such as is found in our sidewalks.

Owing to the snow storm on Sabbath last, the Rev. D. Watson, of Beaverton was unable to hold service in the Eldon Church as announced. He will preach in that church, (D. V.) next Sabbath, 25th inst., at 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Investigation.—P. O. Inspector, Spry was in town on Tuesday last to investigate a charge preferred against the Postmaster of this place, of opening a letter. The charge, however, was not sustained, as it appears the letter was for the son of the Postmaster, who being away had authorized his parents to open letters for him.

Good Sawing.—One day last week, at Lot 8, Con. 6th, Eldon, Messrs. Wm. McKee and John Bell cut a cord of Basswood in fifteen minutes, with a cross-cut saw, and claim they can do it over again in less time if anyone will make it worth their while.

Shade Trees.—Now is the time for planting shade trees. Property owners can increase the value of their lots 25 per cent. by the careful planting and tending of a few shade trees. It will beautify the village and also render our streets much more pleasant.

The Weather.—During the greater part of the past week the weather has been so broken as to cause an almost entire suspension of outdoor farmwork. The strong wind which prevailed on Monday last, however, did much towards drying up both roads and fields.

The store recently occupied by McMillan & McLeod has been rented to Messrs. McIntyre & Prior, of Uxbridge, who are opening out a large stock of General Goods, Dry Goods, and Groceries. The proprietors are enterprising gentlemen, and they intend doing a strictly cash business. Their announcement will appear next week.

Some time ago a Mr. Murdoch, editor of *The Highlander*, Inverness, Scotland, came into this neighbourhood lecturing and canvassing for his newspaper. He succeeded in securing quite a number of names—about twenty-five—the majority of whom paid their subscription, \$3.50. Since that time nothing has been heard either of the paper or subscriptions. The question now is: was he an impostor? If not, why have those papers not turned up?

We do not know that the boys and girls of Woodville are any worse than those of any other place, but we cannot but think that parents in our village are a little too lax in the matter of allowing their children on the streets after dark. Every night the street is crowded up to a late hour with a troop of boys and girls, who rush up and down the sidewalks whooping and yelling like mad. Now, we do not object to childish play, but the streets after dark is hardly the place for children the size of those seen on our streets, and it is not wise for parents to allow it.

Mr. N. S. Sherman, who left Woodville a short time ago for the United States, writes us from Erie, Pa.:—"Times are flourishing here, every line of business running its full capacity. Machine and engine works running day and night. A firm here has just received an order of \$700,000, all iron work, to be completed in three years. There are no less than 6,000 men employed in iron manufacturing here, and new factories are being built. A general prosperity in all lines of trade appears to be rapidly growing. Wages range from \$2.00 to \$3.50 per day for good mechanics, first-class board \$4.00 per week." We are afraid the above is a little too enthusiastic, but from the various reports and the extensive emigration now going on from Canada, it is beyond a question that "times" are rapidly brightening in the U. S.

BY-LAW No.

BEING A BY-LAW TO RAISE THE PROPORTION OF FUNDS TO BE CONTRIBUTED BY THE MUNICIPALITY OF THE TOWNSHIP OF ELDON TOWARDS THE DRAINAGE OF CERTAIN LANDS SITUATE IN THE TOWNSHIPS OF MARIPOSA AND ELDON, AS SET OUT BY THE REPORT OF JAMES DIXON, ESQ., P. L. S., BEING THE SUM OF \$1,998.58 FOR COMPLETING THE SAME.

Provisionally adopted the Fifth day of April, 1880.

WHEREAS the council of the Township of Mariposa have by By-Law No. 240 provided for the drainage of these lands and for borrowing the funds necessary therefor.

AND WHEREAS the said council have served the Reeve of this Municipality with a copy of the report of the said James Dixon, Esq., P. L. S. Containing estimates of the said drainage works, and an assessment of the real property to be benefited by said drainage, and stating the proportion of benefit, which in his opinion would be derived by every road and lot, or portion of lot from said drainage which said assessment as far as it relates to the Township of Eldon is the same as is hereunder set out.

AND WHEREAS the said council of Eldon are of opinion that the drainage of the said locality is desirable.

BE it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Eldon, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 174 of the Revised Statutes of Ontario.

1st. That the said report, so far as the same relates to the said Township of Eldon be adopted.

2nd. That the municipal corporation of the Township of Eldon do pay to the Corporation of the Township of Mariposa, the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty-five dollars and forty cents, being the amount in said report to be contributed by the said Township of Eldon as its proportion or share of the funds necessary for the said works, in fifteen annual instalments of Thirty Dollars and Thirty-six cents each, on the

following the passing of this By-Law, and that the Reeve of the said Township of Eldon, shall give his order on the Treasurer thereof for the said yearly payments, and cause the same to be paid to the Treasurer of the said Township of Mariposa, at the office of the said Treasurer, on the days and times aforesaid.

3rd. That for the purpose of paying the sum of Four Hundred and Fifty-five Dollars and Forty Cents, the amount charged against the lands in this Municipality so to be benefited, other than the roads belonging to the said Municipality, the following special rates, over and above all other rates, shall be assessed and levied in the same manner, and at the same time as taxes are levied upon the undermentioned lots, and parts of lots, and the amount of said special rates assessed as aforesaid against each lot, or part of lot respectively, shall be divided into fifteen equal parts, and one such part shall be assessed and levied, as aforesaid in each year, for fifteen years after the final passing of this By-Law, during which the said instalments are accruing due:—

For Roads, to be paid out of the general funds of the Township, \$7.50

4th. That the sum of Seven Dollars and Fifty cents, being the amount assessed against the roads of this Municipality, be paid to the Treasurer of the Township of Mariposa, out of the general funds of the Township, on the order of the Reeve, within one year after the final passing of this By-Law.

5th. That the drain when complete shall, so far as the share of this Township is concerned therein, be kept in repair and maintained at the cost of the lands and roads assessed for construction, said lands paying in the same relative proportion as the foregoing assessment.

NOTICE!

ANY person wishing to appeal against any part of the above assessment hereby notified that the Council will hold Court of Revision and Appeal, for that purpose at Victoriaville, on Saturday, May 1st, 1880. And further take notice that person who intends to appeal to have By-Law, or any part thereof quashed, or within ten days after the final passing of it, serve a notice in writing upon the Reeve or other head officer, and upon the Clerk of this Municipality, of his intention to make application for that purpose to one of Majesty's Superior Courts of Law, at Toronto during the term next ensuing the final passing of this By-Law, or he will not be heard in this behalf.
