THE Township of Mariposa Auditors' report for the year 1881 shows the receipts of the municipality to have been \$18,512.10 and expenditures \$15,304.56, leaving a balance on hand of \$3,207.54.

The Grand Trunk Railway is again negotiating with the Great Western authorities for a fusion of the two roads. Fears of the Western becoming a through line to the Atlantic in conjunction with the Ontario and Quebec Railway is stimulating the Grand Trunk to strong efforts.

It is quite possible that before long we may hear of another Czar having been assassinated. Violent placards are again appearing at St. Petersburg, and one which is of the most rabid character, declares that Alexander III. is now condemned to death definitely and without appeal.

THE move lately made by our cousins to the south respecting polygamy is already showing a good effect. A report from Utah says that no polygamous marriage has been celebrated since Edmunds' Bill passed while many of the "Apostles" are removing their multitude of wives to separate houses to avoid arrest under the clause which makes cohabitation with more than one woman a misdemeanor.

WE have just completed the issue of the Auditors' Report of the Township of Eldon for the year 1881, and from a reference to the statement advertised in our columns of last week it will be seen that this township, financially, is not in a slight degree flourishing. The receipts for the past year were \$17,891.15, with expenditures amounting to \$17,700.20, leaving a surplus of \$190.95. To counterbalance this surplus we have liabilities, \$44,000.00, with assets, \$6,237.00, an excess of liabilities of \$37,763.00. This excess is due to the bonus granted in 1869 to the Toronto and Nipissing Railway Co. of \$44,000.00.
