The assets of the township are placed at \$16,403.17, and liabilities \$20,341,03, an excess of liabilities over assets of \$3,937.86.

WE have just completed the issue of the Auditors' Report of the Township of Eldon for the year 1881, and from a reference to the statement advertised in our columns of last week it will be seen that this township, here, we know not where. financialy, is not in a slight degree flourishing The receipts for the past year were \$17,891 .-15, with expenditures amounting to \$17,700. 20., leaving a surplus of \$190.95. To counterbalance this surplus we have liabilities, \$44,000.00, with assets, \$6,237.00, an excess of liabilities of \$37,763.00. This excess is due to the bonus granted in 1869 to the Toronto and Nipissing Railway Co. of \$44,. 000,00. We would ask our township fathers to carefully consider the position. We are fully aware of the fact that the cause of this state of affairs does not lay with them. The wretched incapacity which for years has managed the tinances of this township is only to blame, and the fact now staring us in the face is, that thirteen years have now expired of the time in which these railway debentures were to have been paid and all that has as yet been accumulated for that purpose is \$6,237.06 Truly, the outlook is not pleasing. When the honus by-law was passed one of its clauses provided "That for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of the said debentures and interest thereon at the rate aforesaid, an equal special rate of eighteen mills in the dollar shall in ad lition to all other rates be levied and collected in each year upon all the rateable propery in the said municipality during the said term of twenty years from the coming into effect of this by law unless such debentures shall be sooner paid." This would have placed by this time more than one-half the amount of the necessary funds in the town ship treasury, but from some cause or other this provision has not been complied with.
