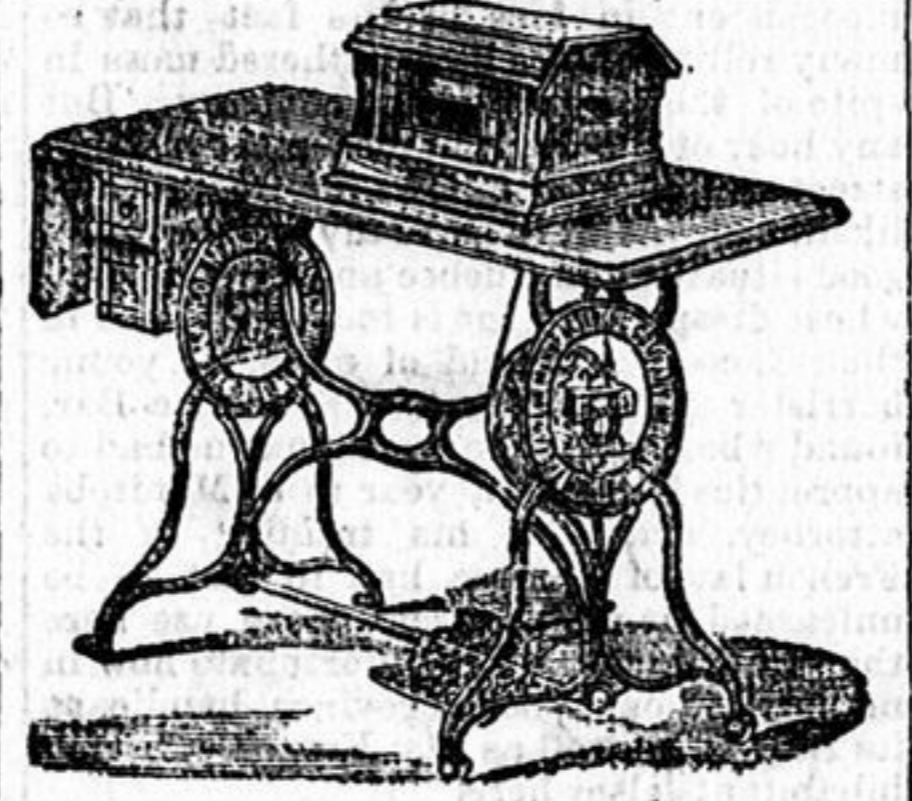

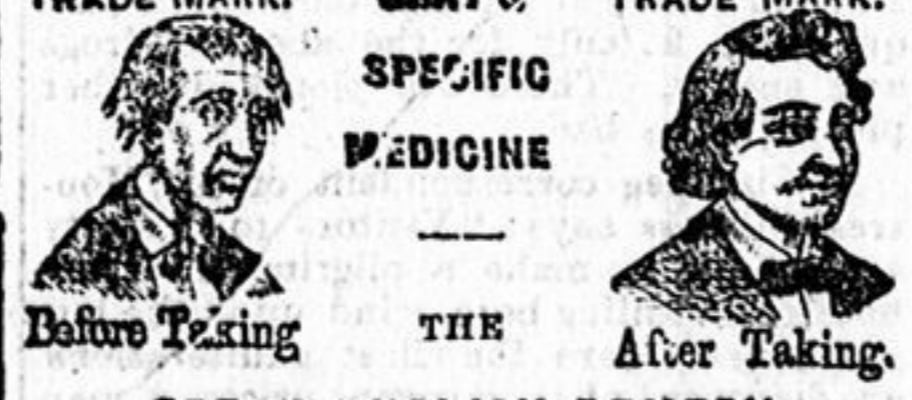

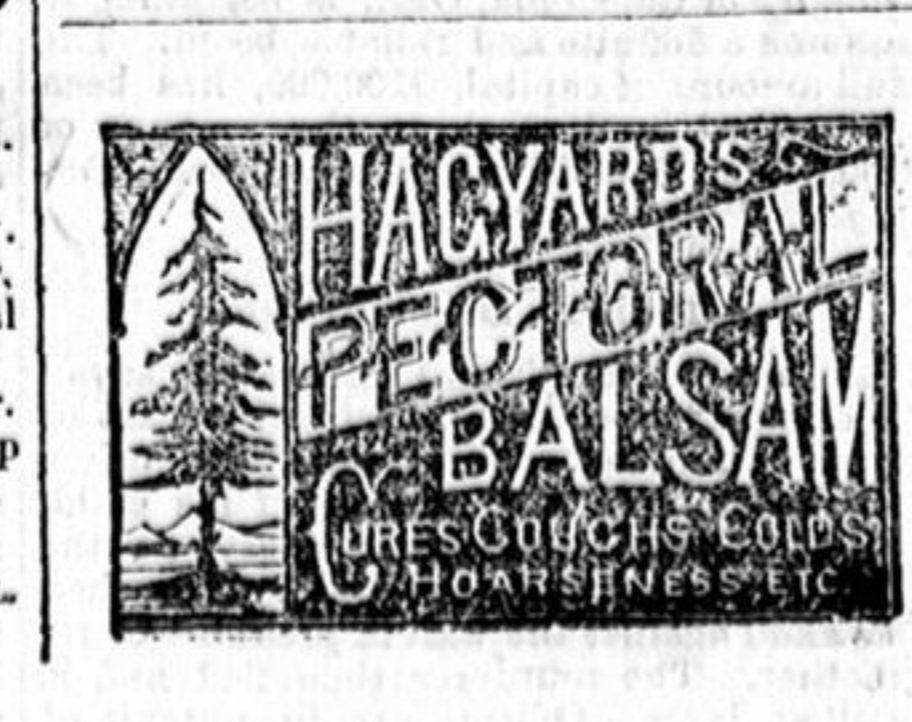

LOSS BY FIRE.—The shingle mill
owned by Stell and Munro was de-
stroyed by fire last Monday evening,
April 10th. The fire was thought to
have originated from the furnace and

caught on fire. Loss estimated at \$2,-
000; insurance, \$400.
