The annual report of the Ontario Deaf and Dumb Institution, at Belleville, for the past year has been published, and is now before us. There were 296 pupils in the institution during that term, 14 of whom are from the County of Ontario. The work of the year has been very effective, the very best methods of instruction known for the deaf and dumb being adopted. The superintendent in a note to the editor, says: "There are many deaf-mute children in the Province whose parents and friends are not aware of the liberal arrangements made for the education and improvement of such unfortunates, and there may be some within the circle of your readers. All muter who reside in this Province, between the ages of seven and twenty years, are admitted to all the privileges free of charge, being furnished with tuition, books, washing, lights, fuel and everything necessary, except clothing and travelling expenses, if their friends think they are unable to pay the sum of \$50 yearly. Only 8 or 10 out of 260 now here pay anything, so that the Institution may be said to be free."
