Editorial Notes.

[By the Editor or gathered from Exchange.]

The completion of the Canada Pacific Railway has caused a great change in the administration of the affairs of the English Navy in the Pacific. Hereafter, according to a recent decision of the Admiralty, they will commission and repair ships at the western terminus of the railway on a larger scale than either at Hong Kong or Malta, the railway company to carry the stores, machinery, ships' crews, &c., very cheaply. Herebefore every ship on station came home once in three years to be repaired. Hereafter they can remain out, thus saving, it is estimated, \$50,000 annually. Another result will be the creation of reserve English vessels in the Pacific to use in case of an emergency.

MR. O'CONNOR'S bill transferring the power of selling land for taxes from county treasurers to the treasurers of townships and villages, is a very important improvement in the law. Under the present system the sales are advertised in one paper in the county town, which generally has little or no circulation in remote parts of the county, consequently land is often sold for a song, and after the lapse of the year, which the law allows for redemption in such cases, a deed is given and the former and, in fact, the real owner is put to a great deal of trouble and expense to get his property back. Mr. O'CONNOR'S bill has come none too soon.

No MATTER how much one may differ, theologically or politically, from Charles Bradlaugh, every generous-minded man must admire the pluck and bull-dog tenacity of the great English iconoclast. Eight years ago he was elected to represent Northampton in the British House of Commons. He refused to take the oath after the customary form, demanding his right to affirm. Afterwards he declared his willingness to take the oath, but said it would be a meaningless form to him. Insisting on his right to take the seat to which he was elected, he was put out of the House by force. His election was declared void; but the sturdy Northampton men re-elected him. Year after year he was refused the right to sit in the House, until 1885, when the Commons at last yielded and allowed him to take the oath. Since then Bradlaugh has brought forward at each session a bill abolishing compulsory oaths and giving all legislators, public officers and witnesses in all courts of law throughout the United Kingdom the right to affirm. Three times this bill has been defeated, but by a decreasing majority at each session. Last week it was carried by one hundred majority. This is a great victory for Bradlaugh and it gives evidence of the growth of a liberal—some will think a lax—spirit in religious matters in England.

Township of Thorah.

BY-LAW NO. 2 OF 1888.

A By-law to close up and sell a portion of the trespass road on lot 6 in the 11th concession of the Township of Thorah.

The Corporation of the Township of Thorah hereby enacts that from and after the final passing of this By-law, all that portion of the trespass road on lot 6 in the 11th concession of the said Township of Thorah lying between the western limit of a deviation of the said trespass road (which said deviation is established and defined by By-law No. 4 of the year 1887 passed by the said Corporation of Thorah, on the 1st day of October, A. D. 1887.) and the Talbot river—be and the same is hereby closed up and no longer to be used or considered a Public Highway of the said Township of Thorah.

And it is further enacted that the herein described portion of trespass road so closed up, may be sold to the proprietor of the land lying adjacent to the same for the sum of twenty-five dollars provided that if the proprietor of the adjacent land shall not within the space of one year from the date of the final passing of this By-law, complete the purchase of the herein described portion of trespass road by accepting conveyance of the same and paying the price herein set forth, then, and in that case it may be lawful for the Corporation of Thorah to sell the same to any other person for twenty-five dollars or any greater sum.

And it is further enacted that the Reeve be and is hereby authorized on behalf of the Corporation to execute a conveyance, on the aforesaid terms, of the herein described portion of road and cause the Seal of the Corporation to be affixed thereto.
