UNFORTUNATE Ireland's bloody history does not contain among all its deeds of blood so atrocious a crime as that which will be found recorded in another column of this paper, That so terrible a deed should have been perpetrated when the nation's cause was about to receive the brightest change, cannot be too deeply regretted, and all those who have watchel the struggle must feel it a terrible blow. Although the horrid crime cannot be imputed to the Irish as a people still the effect will be to alienate much sympathy from them and their cause. We notice that all Ireland is most emphatic in its denunciation of the crime and the Land Leaguers among the foremost. It is however, too late, the crimes and deeds of horror which have lately so stained the country's reputation, if not the acts of the League directly are in a great measure the outcome of its teachings and it must be held responsible. Now that this terrible tragedy has happened Mr Parnell and his colleagnes are among the most deeply affected. The event has caused much excitement in England and it is difficult to see the end, A strong feeling of indignation has been aroused and one that it may be hard for the Gladstone administration to stem. However, should Mr. Gladstone succeed we underestimate that noble gen tleman's character if he allows passionate revenge for the acts of a few to interfere with the new and promising policy about to be inaugurated by his unfortunate celleague, Lord Frederick Cavendish.

#### THORAH TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Council met at one o'clock p.m. Members

all present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Petitions presented :- A. M. Stewart and eight others for aid on the Portage Road at Lot 3. Memorial from Miss S. Turner in the matter of land for a road between Lots 20 and 21, 1st Con, Reports put in :-Township Commissioner in the matter of certain roads and bridges referred to him for inspection. Village Commissioner in the matter of sidewalk on Mara st., &c. George Smith, P. L. S., in the matter of the survey on the town line between Brock and Thorah. Communication read from Mr. E. Major, Port Perry, claiming \$10 compensation for re-granting a village lot sold to him in error. Resolved, that the following grants be made for public improvements between the 5th and 6th concessions at lots 6 and 7 for gravelling, \$25.00; netween 5th and 6th concessions at lot 2, ditching, \$10; between 2nd and 3rd concessions at lot 2, culvert and ditching, \$40; Portage Road at lot 3, repairing, \$25; town line between Brock and Thorah, from lot 17 west opening, \$100. And that the Township Commissioner be also instructed to make the necessary repairs at the following bridges :clear the flood wood from the same; Froman's bridge; bridge over the Beaver, between the 2nd and 3rd concessions; bridge on the town line between Thorah and Eldon at 1st concession. That the village Commissioner be instructed to construct a four feet sidewalk on the east side of Mara street from Main street to the Railway Station, A culvert on Bay street and a sidewalk on John street two feet wide, that the contracts be let as soon as possible and that the payments for the work be made on and after the 1st of December. Resolved, that the Township Commissioners when letting contracts in that section of the township be instructed to examine the outlets for the ditches between the 1st and 2nd concessions and report thereon as soon as possible. Resolved, that a half-acre on lot 4, 7th con., be leased for a gravel pit for a term of ten years, that the sum of \$25 be paid for the same, and that the Commissioner be instructed to form a road to the said pit and stake out the boundaries of the same. Resolved, that the sum of \$50 be refunded to Mr. Jno. Morrison, arrears of taxes charged in error on part of the north half of lot 4 in the 4th

#### CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, ELDON.

The Rev. Dr. Campbell, of Colling wood preached last Sabbath in the church to a very large congregation, in English and Gaelie. Dr. Campbell, it will be remembered, preached to the congregation for about twelve months five years ago. On Monday evening the Doctor lectured on "What I saw in Scotland," to a very attentive andience. Towards the close of the lecture he referred to the action of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada regarding the "Temporalities Suit," and stated that in his opinion no parliament could settle such a question, that it was the greatest nonsense to think so, that the courts of justice alone could do so. He spoke highly in praise of the Hon. Edward Blake, whose sense of justice moved him to consider the minority the Old Kirk in Canada. At the close of the proceedings the following resolutions were unanimously passed :-
