l'elow we give the remaining cases tried at the Spring Assizes which were crowded out of our issue of last week :-

Hopkins vs. Smith .- The plaintiff had sold a quantity of logs to the defendant, and there was a dispute as to the measurement. The defendant offered \$100 in settlement which the plaintiff refused to accept, claimmg : 500. He recovered a judgment for \$103, but was ordered to pay the defendant's costs, as the amount which he recover ed n ore than the amount offered was only \$3. the court ruled that this was too tr fling a sum to entitle him to costs, and that the suit was not brought to recover not \$3 but \$500.

Middleton vs. Steel. - This case was ordered to stand over until the next assizes, as the evidence of a witness in Manitoba, which was to be taken by commission had not been returned.

Russel vs. Stephenson. - This case being entered in chancery, was ordered to stand over until the next chancery sittings.

McIntosh vs. Mansfield. -Action for rent and an account. Referred to Judge Dean by consent,

Queen vs. Wallace .- Larceny. On being called the prisoner did not answer and his bail was called to deliver him up, but did not answer.

Crandell vs. Standard Insurance Co .-Action on a policy of insurance on steamer Vi melrbilt for \$1,500. The defince was that other insurances were effected without rotice to or assent of the detendants, and that other companies had been applied for insurance and refused to accept the risk, of which fact the defendants should have been notified. The case was settled out of court, the defendants paying \$500 in full and each

party paying their own costs. Fee vs, McAlpine. - This action was brought to recover the amount of a due bill made by the defendant, and excited a great deal of interest. It was tried without a jury. The due bill as it is at present is dated July 27, 1875. The defendant contended that it was made and dated July 17. and that the date was altered by writing the 2 over the 1. This figure 2 differs very much from the other figures on the due bill. The plaintiff had been examined before Judge Dean and then swore this transaction took place on a circus day in Lindsay, and gave several instances which enabled him to fix that fact on his mind, and that the circus day was on the 27th Jrly; that he saw a circus bill a short time before with that date on it; and that the due bill was in the same condition now as when the defendant wrote it and gave it to him. On the trial it was proven clearly that the circus took place in Lindsay on the 17th. The defendant now swore that this transaction did not take place on a circus day. He admitted having sold greenbacks to the defendant on that day amounting to \$344, and having recovered the amount by cheque. He was subjected to a most rigid cross examination, in the course of which he was made to contradict himself many times. His books were produced and showed an entry on July 19th of business done on the 17th, but contained no entry of any dea ings with the defendant on the 27th. The defendant admitted having given the due bill on the 17th for \$344, and produced a check for that amount, made on the 19th which check Mr. Fee had presented to the bank and got cashed as was shown By his bank book. The defendant said that plaintiff came to him on the 19th a short time before the bank closed and asked for the money promising to bring up the due bill next lay, but that he had never brought it up although he got the money for it. He also swore positively that the transaction took place on the circus day, which was the 17th; that he had written the due bill and that the date had been changed. Mr. B B Osler, the counsel for the plaintiff, made a very powerful address to the court in favor of his client, urging, that if the verdict was given against him it would be equivalent to finding him guilty of perjury and forgery, and that the evidence was not strong enough for that. In giving judgment His Lordship regretted that the case had not been left to the jury, but said that he was not one to shirk his duty because it was uppleasant. He said he was satisfied that the date of the due bill bad been

Percheron Horses.

Harper's Monthly for February has a lengthy and exhaustive article on this sub_ ject, from which we make the following extracts :

The Percheron horse is undoubtedly the most symmetrical and powerful for his size; and possesses the finest action and greatest endurance of all the large breeds in Europe. His general type is also the most ancient of any of which we have record or tradition, and this is the principal reason why he is more prepotent than others in transmitting his superior qualities to his offspring.

Tradition asserts that the first great improvement in refining the large horses of France was made by Barb stallions captured from the Moors. In 731 thousands of these fine Barb stallions were captured (for the Moors ride such only, and never mares) and distributed among the French soldiers, who, on returning to their farms, bred them to their own large native mares. The best and most uniform of this produce were then selected and coupled among themselves. the result of which, together with other wellmade crosses from time to time since that period, gives us the improved Percherons of the present day, described as follows:

Head clean, bony and small for the size of the animal; ears short, mobile, erect and fine-pointed; eyes bright, clear, large and prominent; forehead broad; nostrils large,

open. Neck a trifle short, yet harmoniously rounding to the body and gracefully curved. Breast broad and deep, with great muscular development; shoulders sloping; withers high; back short; body well ribbed up nump broad, long and moderately sloping to the tail, which is attached high; quarters wide, well let down, and swelling with powerful muscles.

Legs flat and wide, withhard, clean bones, and extra large, strong joints, cords and tendons; short from the hocks and knees down; pasterns upright; hoofs full size, solid, tough.

Action bold, square, free and easy. Temper kind; disposition docile, but energetic and vigorous; hardy, enduring and long-lived; precocious; able to be put to light work at eighteen to twenty months old, possessing immense power for his size; never balking or refusing to draw at a dead pull; stylish, elegant and attractive in appearance; easy elastic, and graceful in




