Editorial Notes.

THE general elections are announced
for next month, the 20th of June, nomi-
nations on the 13th, it is said. Owing
to the operation of the new bill the
date cannot be definitely placed as the
elections do not necessarily come off
simultaneously as formerly.

Mr. A. P. COCKBURN of Beaverton,
received the nomination as Reform
candidate for North Ontario, at the
Convention held at Beaverton on Satur-
day of last week. Mr. Cockburn will
make a strong man, he being very
popular in the constituency.

THE Dublin assassinations are still
the subject of much comment. The
fact that with the extraordinary force
of police and detectives which the
government are enabled to employ, the
assassins have not yet been discovered,
is leading to many doubts as to the
actual efficiency of the force. That
two men could have been butchered in
the heart of a populous city like Dublin
and then escape, the country being at
the time literally swarming with police
and soldiers, seems almost incredible.

It will not be long before the almond-
eyed Chinaman will become as import-
ant a problem in Canadian politics as
he is in American. Already the
rumbling of distrust is heard and many
of our leading journals are devoting
their columns to the problem. Before
the end of August the Chinese popula-
tion of the Dominion in British Colum-
bia will number upwards of 32,000,
considerably outnumbering the whites.
The Americans have long ago arrived
at the conclusion that "John" must be
kept at home, and it now remains for
Canada to do the same.

At last the United States has dis-
covered a means to dispose of the un-
applied balance of the Alabama, or
Geneva award. The sum awarded by
the arbitrators was \$15,500,000, but
the injustice of the decision was ap-
parent, when, after payment of claims
of all classes recognized by the arti-
trators, some \$6,000,000 was left un-
expended. It is manifest that after the
satisfaction of these claims the balance
should have been returned to Great
Britain, but greediness overcame what
little conscience Uncle Sam possessed,
and so the balance was kept. It was
invested in United States bonds, and
has in the interval increased to \$10,000,-
000. The claims heretofore made against
this balance, but disallowed, were those
of insurance companies who suffered
from the work of the Alabama, mer-
chants who paid high premiums for in-
surance in consequence of the danger
from the cruisers, and persons who
suffered loss from Confederate cruisers
for which the Geneva arbitrators refused
to hold Great Britain responsible. The
bill lately passed by the House provides
that claims of any of these classes may
be brought before the Court of Claims,
with power of appeal to the U. S.
Supreme Court. All such cases are to
be settled within three years, and if the
\$10,000,000 is not sufficient to satisfy
them all, it is to be divided among them
pro rata. Every honest American
should blush with shame at this mea-
sure, and it certainly is small and un-
dignified for a great nation. After all
just demands had been paid simple
honesty should have dictated the return
of the unexpended balance.
