THE coronation of the Czar of Russia has been again postponed, this time for a year, owing to the receipt of information pointing to another conspiracy to destroy the Czar

THERE will be 211 members in the new House of Commons, the Province contributing in this proportion: Ontario, 92; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; British Columbia and Prince Edward's Island, 6 each; Manitoba, 5.

THE Toronto post-office letter carriers struck last week because a colored man was to be employed. The man had to be found a position in the office until the matter could be settled. We were of the opinion that the color of a man's skin did not affect his social status in this country, but it is evident from recent occurrences that we must change. Toronto hotel keepers have refused accommodation to a company of respectable colored singers, and now a colored man must not be permitted to work among the lordly upstarts of the Toronto postal delivery.

Mr. George Otto Trevelyan, who has been chosen by Mr. Gladstone to fill the important and difficult post of Chief Secretary for Ireland, has made his mark in both politics and literature. His mother, was the sister of Lord Macaulay, and Mr. Trevelyan's biography of his famous uncle is adjudged to be one of the best works of the kind in the English language. He has since produced an equally able and critical review of the early life and times of the statesman, Charles James Fox. These works have shown the new Irish Secretary to have inherited an unusually clear intellect and refined literary taste. In politics Mr. Trevelyan is an advanced Liberal. He has been in parliament since 1855, having entered it then at the age of twenty-seven. In the second Gladstone administration he was appointed Civil Lord of the Admiralty, which office he resigned in July 1870, on account of his opposition to the Educational Bill introduced by the administration. For years he advocated a sweeping army reform, including the abolition of purchase, which was effected in 1871. Last year he was appointed Secretary to the Admiralty Board, which post he held until his late appointment to the Irish Secretaryship. Mr. Trevelyan has thus been properly trained to deal with public business, while his liberality of opinion fits him to administer the new policy marked out by Mr. Gladstone.
