WOODVILLE VILLAGE COUNCIL.
Council met May 12th, 1884. Present, Messrs. Campbell, Degeer, McArthur and Grant.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that Mr. Campbell act as chairman. Carried.

Minutes of last meeting read and sustained Mr. McArthur reported that W. W. Armstrong repaired the sidewalks and the cost of repairs is fifteen dollars as he did not furnish as much lumber as expected.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Grant, that the Clerk be authorized to procure a copy of Harrison's Municipal Manual, for the use of the Council. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that the Council do pass a by-law to commute statute labor at seventy-five cents per day if paid to the Treasurer before the fifteenth day of June. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Degeer, seconded by Mr. McArthur, that the Clerk be instructed to notify the Telegraph Company and all persons having posts on the streets, to remove them at least ten feet from the line. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Grant, that the Council adopt a proper system of building sidewalks. Said sidewalks to be graded from the highest level of the ground with sleepers set on cross pieces, and to stand clear of the ground, with no filling against the outside. Sidewalk to be eight feet six inches from the line fence, and to place three proper crossings, one at

Church street, one at Agnes Street and one at Elm Street to be placed at east side of streets. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that the corporate seal procured by the Clerk be adopted as the corporate seal of the municipality of the Village of Woodville. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that the resolution passed by this council on the 35th of April, adopting a scale for statute labor be rescinded and the following scale be now adopted:—For an assessment up to \$400, two days; from \$400 to \$600, three days; from \$600 to \$1200, four days, from \$1200 to \$2000, five days; from \$2000 to \$3000, six days and for every \$1000 over \$3000 or any fractional part over \$500 one additional day. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Grant that the resolution imposing a tax on dogs be rescinded and instead of levying a tax on the assessment, that the owners or harborers of dogs be obliged to purchase a tag to be put on their dogs, and that the constable be authorized to destroy any dog running at large without a tag and that the Clerk be authorized to procure twenty-five tags for that purpose. Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that the minutes of the council be published in the WOODVILLE ADVOCATE from time to time.

The Council went into committee and passed by-laws No. 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Council adjourned to meet at the call of the Reeve

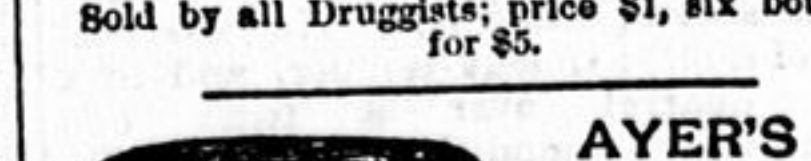
