This may be from the farm yard, and quite generally such is the case. For some years the water in a well may be pure and wholesome, but by-and-bye the soil between it and the barnyard will become so impregnated with pollution that an unhealthy quality will be imparted to it, and disease will result from its use. We know of several wells in this village of which this may be said.
