Interesting Gossip From Other Places

Georgian Bay Notes.
Collingwood Sons of England celebrated St George's day by a successful banquet at the Grand Central.

A few evenings ago a Mr. Mayo of Collingwood was returning from his day's work he was brutally assaulted by some unknown person and left senseless.

The "Pacific" and the "Atlantic" are making their regular trips to the Sault from Collingwood, while the "Northern Belle" plies between Collingwood and Parry Sound.

The docks at Penetanguishene are being repaired. Something should be done to the Reformatory wharf. If repaired it would be a convenient getting-off-place for visitors to the prison.

Several corn-laden vessels have already arrived at Midland. One laden with 32,000 bushels got on a rock near Hope Island. 3,000 bushels were taken out dry.

The "Maxwell," "Tender," "Kate Pilgrim" and "Shawanga" boats of Penetang have been examined by Government Inspector, McNeilly and pronounced safe and sound.

Parry Sound is to become a town, a bill having passed the Ontario Legislature to that effect.

Work on the Midland Esplanade is going on favorably. When completed Midland will be one of the best calling places for vessels on the Georgian Bay.

Culliv.
A decidedly dry and warm week has just passed and should the same weather continue much longer serious injury to the crops in the light soil of this locality will ensue.

The "Orillia" has made her first regular trip to Strawberry Island and the "St. Clair," the new aspirant to fame and fortune on the waters of Couchiching will also soon be in shape for work.

A perfect real estate boom has struck this town and from all appearances the place stands a good chance of being overdone, as it was a few years ago.

On Saturday evening last Mississauga St. was about as crowded a thoroughfare considering the size of our town as could be found in Toronto.

Orillia now claims "the boss" Lacrosse team and great things are expected during the season. The schedule of games as published by the new Lacrosse Association gives the games to be played by our team as follows:—Brantford on the 24th inst., here; goes to Richmond Hill, on June 3rd; Toronto, June 11th; Paris, July 1st; Ottawa, July 30th, and Niagara Falls, on Sept. 8th.

Sunderland.
We have organized a cricket club in this town and we now wait patiently for challenges. A splendid ground is being prepared for the club on the Driving Park Grounds.

Preparations are already being made for the Fall Show by the authorities of the Driving Association. The track is to be re-graded and stables and pens built and also a large grand stand erected.

Presbytery of Lindsay.
WOODVILLE, MAY 19th.

The Presbytery of Lindsay met here to-day. The Rev. Jno. Gillies pastor of St. Andrew's church, Eldon, applied to be received into the church, also deputation from the congregation of Eldon, consisting of Messrs. John Torry, John Campbell, and D. A. McIntyre applied to be received as a congregation, on motion of Dr. McTavish, which was seconded by the Rev. A. Currie, the minister and congregation were received unanimously.

Thorah Township Council.

May 14th 1887. Council met at 4 p.m., all present. Minutes of last Council read and approved. Petitions presented Mrs. Napier for aid for Mrs. Colville, C. McLean, for compensation for land taken from his lot in locating the road between the 2nd and 3rd Cons. at Lot 5. Mr. J. Boakes heard in the matter of Elizabeth Boakes. Mr. J. J. Cave, application to use the Town Hall for band practice. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Donnell in the matter of Elizabeth Boakes that the Council do grant \$2.00 per week for her support, the said grant to continue for three weeks and that Dr. Grant be authorized and requested to make her one visit and report to the next Council as to her state and condition.—Carried. Moved by Mr. McRae, seconded by Mr. Galloway, that the Beaverton band be allowed to use the Town Hall for practicing for two nights each week.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the matter of compensation to Mr. Charles McLean be laid over for further consideration and enquiry until the next meeting of the Council.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Donnell, that the following grants be made for public improvements:—Townline between Thorah and Brock at Lot 1, gravelling, \$115.00; between lots 5 and 6, con. 2, gravelling, \$10.00; between cons. 2 and 3, lot 18, culvert and stumping, \$16.00; Lake Shore road con. 3, gravelling, \$30.00; between cons. 4 and 5, con. 4 and 5, at lot 7, repairing embankment and gravelling, \$20.00; Centre road from between cons. 1 and 2, north, repairing gravel, \$100.00; between cons. 5 and 6 at lot 2, turnpiking etc., \$10.00; between cons. 3 and 4, at lots 5 and 6, culverts to be repaired or removed as requested; townline between Brock and Thorah from lot 18, West to the Lake, clear full width of the road and gravel and turnpike a track two rods in the centre, gravel 20 rods, heavy, 15 inches in centre rounded down to the sides, track 6 feet, commencing at lot 18 and working West, pit in a culvert at lot 16 as soon as possible so that the approaches can be completed by the Pathmaster with the Statute Labor; North Centre road at the crossing between cons. 6 and 7, culvert, estimated \$12.00; road from Bruce's to Gamebridge, repairing grave, \$20.00; Centre road crossing between cons. 8 and 9, culvert, side road cons. 5, 6 and 8, ditching and turnpiking, \$15.00; between cons. 9 and 10, lot 10, ditching, \$10.00; Townline between Thorah and Eldon, constructing road, conditional, \$30.00; that the Commissioner for the North division of the Township be instructed to inspect the bridge at Buckler's, and report as to the best method of renewing the same, to ascertain if piles can be driven to support the centre, and to furnish plan and estimate for wideness, the span of the said bridge not less than ten feet, to inspect the bridge at Wallace's, between cons. 6 and 10 and report as to the best method of repairing or renewing the same and to construct a culvert between cons. 9 and 10, east of the side road between lots 5 and 6, all the contracts to be let as soon as possible.—Carried. Council filed in pathmaster instructions for the current year and ordered the same to be issued. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. F. McRae, that the Reeve be authorized to furnish Mr. Hugh McPherson with a railway ticket should he think it expedient.—Carried. A number of accounts were presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. F. McRae, seconded by Mr. Fraser, that the Council do now adjourn to meet on Saturday, the 4th day of June at 4 o'clock p.m.—Carried. GEORGE SMITH, Sr., Township Clerk.
