Suspicious Characters.

Since the recent attempted burglary at the post office the community has been kept in considerable excitement over the appearance of suspicious characters. On Thursday last two men were arrested and now lie in Whitty jail awaiting trial on the suspicion of being burglars. It appears that on Thursday these fellows made their appearance in the vicinity of the station as usual and about dinner time one called at the house of Mr. Bathgate on Main street and demanded dinner which was given him, he then passed down to Mr. P. McMillan's and demanded the same. Mr. D. McMillan happened in while the man was present and knowing of his visit to Bathgate's at once came to the conclusion that all was not right and consequently a watch was placed on his action which proved in the course of the afternoon so peculiar that it was thought justifiable to arrest the pair. A company of citizens proceeded to the track, secured the hand car and before the fellows knew what was passing they were secured and placed in the lock-up. Detective Spence of the G. T. R. was telegraphed for and they were arraigned before G. F. Bruce, J. P., who sent them to Whitty for trial. Although the indictment was on a charge of trespass it is evident that they are part of a gang who have been operating this section, for two handsome revolvers fully loaded, a powder flask, several blasting cartridges, a candle and other portions of the crackman's outfit were found where the prisoners were seen to secrete them. During the evening the alarm was raised that others had been seen and that the residence of Mr. Jas. Smith, corner of Main and Mara streets had been entered. This was in a sense true, a very vicious looking man having appeared at a late hour demanding an article not sold and who proceeded to carefully investigate the premises. With these facts in mind a very general uneasiness was felt and everyone who happened to possess a revolver proceeded at once to load her up for burglars. However, with the exception of the two aforesaid no further arrests were made.

Anniversary Entertainment.

The Beaverton Odd-fellows celebrated the sixty-ninth anniversary of the order on Thursday evening of last week by an entertainment given in the "Alexandria Hall." The large room was very tastefully decorated and the brethren spared no trouble in their efforts to make the company an agreeable and pleasant one. About one hundred and fifty persons were present and all listened to the opening ceremonial with much interest particularly the address of the Noble Grand, Mr. P. McMillan which gave a short resume of the work of the order as follows:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:—

It gives me, in behalf of Beaverton Lodge, great pleasure to meet you once again at our annual gathering, and extend to you hearty thanks and welcome. As Odd-fellows we meet this day in commemoration of an event, which we believe to have been one of great blessing to those who are of our Brotherhood, namely, the founding of Odd-fellowship in America. Sixty-nine years ago this event occurred and in the years which have passed many are the blessings that have been breathed for the men and the institution which have been so productive of good to our race. Aside from the enormous figures presented by our brethren of the United States and which extend into the millions as the result of their ministrations during the year, in the jurisdiction of Ontario alone the brotherhood has paid out in benefits to the sick and distressed, not only of its own membership but to the needy at large, the sum of \$3,037.85, also on \$1,900 for each week in the year. We do not say this in a spirit of boastful pride, nor for it do we claim any thanks, enough for Odd-fellowship to know that a kind and beneficent Providence has placed it within our power to do this work to our needy fellow men. The amount paid to brethren as sick benefits during the year was \$26,312.21 while for surgeons' fees and nursing no less than \$4,502.06 was paid, widows' annuities received, \$12,056.88; orphans' annuities, \$1,024.45; burying deceased brothers, \$3,083.86; burying deceased wives of brothers, \$339.91.

To the brethren of Beaverton Lodge I would address a few words: Brethren, have we not great cause for rejoicing, not only has our order generally progressed but as a lodge the year now passed has been one of happy memory. Death, the Great Destroyer has not called any of our number from us and so far we are not called to mourn his visit, nor has affliction's iron hand dealt heavily with us, in truth we have been blessed, while our number has been largely increased. Harmony has prevailed among us and with heartfelt thankfulness we can now unite in our noble song of Jubilee.

The company then sat down to supper which was served up in excellent style, after which the evening was devoted to games, dancing, etc. The Uxbridge orchestra rendered charming music and altogether a very pleasant evening was enjoyed.
