Obit.

Many of our readers will read with sorrow of the death in California of Mr. Samuel McKay, son of the late Rev. Alex. McKay, formerly of Eldon. From the Santa Ana "Blade" we clip the following sorrowful memoir:—"The funeral of Samuel McKay, the young man who died Saturday at the residence of Archibald McDonald, in the Mountain View district, of consumption, occurred Sunday afternoon from the residence of the latter gentleman, Rev. Dr. Young officiating. The circumstances of his death, dating from the commencement of the fatal disease, are shrouded with unusual sadness and create a painful interest for those who admire the glorious characteristic of heroic devotion.

Four years ago Mr. McKay came from his home, at Summerstown, Canada, with an invalid brother who was afflicted with consumption, and for whose benefit as a last resort, the doctors had recommended the equable climate of Southern California. Another brother was located at Los Angeles, which has been his home. They were sons of Rev. Alex. McKay, the former Presbyterian minister at Summerstown, who has now been dead for a number of years. Samuel and his invalid brother found accommodations at the residence of Mr. McDonald, which is located near the foothills and was deemed a most favorable spot for the stricken one to regain his waning strength.

Unfortunately, his disease was of that extremely virulent type for which there appears to be no remedy, and he gradually sank lower and lower toward the end which awaits the bodies of all mankind. He died about one year after his arrival in California, and was buried in the Santa Ana cemetery. During his sickness Samuel had devoted himself entirely to doing all in his power for his afflicted brother, and from his incessant companionship with the invalid the germs of the same dreaded disease were imbedded in his own system, and he began to show the same unmistakable evidences of destruction with which he had become so familiar in the departed brother.

With the same unmerciful power he was dragged slowly down until all hopes of recovery had departed from the noble breast, and last fall, upon the advice of his brother at Los Angeles, he returned to Summerstown for a farewell visit with his mother and sisters. The climate at the old home proved sadly disastrous to the feeble frame and the malignant disease advanced with such dangerous rapidity that physicians at once remanded him to California where he returned immediately. He once more took up his residence at Mr. McDonald's, and the distressing story of his brother's last days were lived over again, with himself in the character of the stricken one. The brother at Los Angeles, George G. McKay, visited him often, but as Samuel's had been before him, his efforts were of no avail and the faithful nurse and brother gradually sank nearer to the spirit which seemed to beckon it over the identical path on which it had departed to the Great Beyond.

On Saturday last the tired body entered into its eternal rest, and the spirit of Samuel McKay was with that of his brother whom he had so faithfully attended on earth. It was his dying wish that he should be buried by the side of his departed brother, which touching request was fulfilled at the funeral Sunday, and the two bodies which were associated so closely in life, fittingly repose side by side in the eternal sleep of death.

The funeral Sunday afternoon was largely attended, the remaining brother, doubly stricken, being among the mourners. A profusion of beautiful flowers had been arranged by tender hands for the occasion, and cast a halo of sincere sympathy over the sad event. To the sorrowing mother and sister of the departed brothers in their far off Eastern home we send the comforting tidings that the son and brother was as tenderly cared for in his sickness and death as could be bestowed were he at home under mother's and sisters' care, and we wish them all possible condolence in their bereavement.
