**More Outrages.**

What, in the name of all that is good, is this town coming to? Are we under the control of a gang of outlaws and if so, is no attempt to be made to discover the infernal scoundrels who are making the name of this village a by-word for petty violence second to none in the Province? It certainly appears so at present. In the ill starred name of the Scott Act many mean and petty little spites have been worked off and it appears that everyone who has the courage to say that he does not believe in the usefulness of the grog-shop or the use of whiskey is promptly marked for annoyance and may be bodily injury. It is only a short time since we chronicled the vindictive breaking of Mr. Wilson's windows on Bay street and now we learn that on Monday night about 2:30 o'clock the Methodist parsonage was similarly assaulted and the front windows broken with stones. It is almost needless to say the Rev. Mr. McKee is a temperance man and one not afraid to have his views known. The Rev. gentleman, we learn, on hearing the crash, leaped from his bed in time to see several men near the house all, it appears, armed with stones who were prepared for any one who might emerge from the building. Now, fellow citizens, Scott Act or Anti-Scott Act sympathisers, how long is this state of affairs to be allowed to continue? Apparently the authorities of the town are not interested enough to interfere. In other places such outrages would induce a reward for the discovery of the perpetrators but right here things are done differently greatly to our discredit. Every such act going unpunished is an incentive to still greater excesses and we must not be surprised to find more serious results in the future. We have heard considerable of the clever capture of burglars made here recently and when it was thought that more were about every man who could was ready to assist in their capture. How is it with these violators of the peace and safety of our people? Is it not a duty as imperative to protect ourselves from the assaults of those who destroy our property as from those who would steal it? Undoubtedly it is, and yet we venture to assert that in the present instance nothing will be done. Possibly had the Rev. Mr. McKee been killed by one of the stones a ripple of interest might be awakened but until some such thing happens we suppose all will go on as usual. We suggested last week the formation of a vigilance committee and apparently it is becoming daily more necessary. If the law is powerless to assist us perhaps it would be well to try the efficacy of more radical measures. When decent people hesitate to speak their views fearing injury to themselves and property it is certainly time to discover who rule this land and whether the freedom of which we are supposed to be so proud is not after all a myth.
