THE supplementary estimates were brought down in the House of Commons last week. We notice the following items in the vote for Ontario harbors and rivers :- Meaford \$5,000, the town furnishing \$3,000; Thornbury, dredging, \$3,000; improvement of Narrows, between Lake Simcoe and Couchiching, \$500; Collingwood, \$5,000; Penetang, \$10,000.

THE Duke of Rutland, during his attendance upon the Queen in her visit to Berlin had repeated interviews with Prince Bismarck and returned to Eng. land thoroughly impregnated with Prince Biamarck's views on the European situation. According to these, the Czar, advised by the hostile party at St. Petersburg, is determined on war and on a war which shall involve all the nations of Europe in more or less active hostilities. The time at which the first gun is to be fired depends partly on the death of the Emperor Frederick, which is. of course, expected from day to day, and which may be the signal for battle.

An Ontario mining commission has been organized, consisting of the members of the Ontario Cabinet-Mr. John Charlton, M. P., chairman ; A. Blue, Secy. ; Prof. Bell, Wm. Coe and Wm. Hamilton Meritt. The commission will visit Sudbury and other places north, and take what steps may be considered advisable to develope the mineral resources of the province.

An effort was made to float a large cigar-shaped raft of Nova Scotia timber across the ocean and the raft was lost, although had the trial been made at a more favorable time it might have succeeded. It is urged that the Canadian and American governments should send tugs in search of the raft now adrift on the Atlantic. If a steamer or sailing vessel under much headway strikes this onormous derelict it will be lost. It is the most dangerous thing to commerce now affoat in any waters and unless it is found and taken into some harbor or destroyed, we may expect to hear of it doing harm and that too, in a very short time. There are various wrecks admft on the Atlantic that want looking after.

THE prospects are that there will be about 11,000 volunteers under canvas in the various militia camps this summer. About 9,000 others will perform the annual drill in various cities, bringing the grand total up to 20,000 men. It Parliament granted sufficient for the purpose, the force which would be drilled would reach \$7,000. The first camps will be held about the 15th of June.

BRITISH war ships are already arriving at Halifax to assist in the fishery protective service, and, we presume, our Canadian cruisers will be on the coast early. As the United States Senate have seen fit to reject the treaty they have taken the responsibility of debarring their fisherman from all the priviledges of that treaty, and if seizures and harassments continue the blame rests on themselves. American fishermen will be rigidly excluded from the three-nale limit and shut out of all the Caradian and Newfoundland bays.

LEE County, Alabama, is litt'e know; outside the surrounding district nor indeed is its chief little town, Opestika. Yet it once had a perulation most unenviable. Then it is said to have spent \$200,000 in its many drinking saloons

and to have reaped drunkenness, debauchery, idleness and vice to the full. But a few sober, high-minded men went to work with a purpose. They traced the evil to its source and only last year finished their last work by closing up the doors of the last saloon. Now, thirty thousand people live and thrive without a single drink shop in all the country, and with what result? The retail trade is reported to have increased thirty per cent., and the real estate has advanced twenty-five per cent. The higher court has no criminal business to deal with; there are no idlers and loafers; and altogether the people regard the prohibition of liquor as worth half a million dollars a year to the country, not to speak of the increased piety, the high i moral tone, the hospitality and general happiness that give a visitor a restful sense of having arrived at a kind of "God's acre" among the living. There is no whiskey there and now it cannot be had. no one wants it.

A number of Western Ontario cheesemen have decided to petition the Dominion Government against the practice of American dealers shipping products through Canada, and by branding the boxes with a distinctive Canadian mark palm off their manufactures on the English market as Canadian.


