The Law of Newspapers.—The courts have decided that if a person orders his paper discontinued he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount whether the paper is taken from the post office or not. Also, action for fraud can be instituted against any person, whether he is responsible in a financial view or not, who refuses to pay for a publication. Some forget this, and think by merely refusing to take the paper from the post-office settles the matter.

Gaelic Service.—A Gaelic service was held in Bank Street Presbyterian Church yesterday afternoon, some 70 persons being present. The Rev. Mr. McLennan of Underwood acted as preacher, and the singing was conducted in the old style of "lineing." The sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Ross of Woodville, his text being II Corinthians V: 17: Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are become new. "The text in Gaelic is as follows: II Corint. V: 17: "Uime sin, ma tha neach sam bith ann an Crìosd is e reutar nuadh e: claidh na seann nithe seach, feuch rinneadh na h-uile nithe nuadh."

Potato Race.—On Monday afternoon no little excitement was caused up at the east end by the rumor that Peter Clifford was going to run a potato race, against time. Quite a crowd gathered to witness the sport. SAD ACCIDENT.

A very sad and melancholy accident occurred yesterday at the Catholic picnic which took place near Beaverton by which Mr. Frank McRae, a much respected young farmer of Thorah lies in an extremely dangerous condition. Mr. McRae, was superintending the games at the picnic, and when the accident happened, was noting the throwing of the shoulder stone. By some means his attention was distracted from the game and the stone going a little out of its course struck him on the side of the head, crushing it terribly, the unfortunate man was conveyed to the band stand near by, where he was cared for until the arrival of Dr. Grant, who did everything necessary in the case. No promising hopes were held as to his recovery. Mr. McRae is a married man, his wife and child both being present. The accident cast a gloom on all present, and they shortly after dispersed.
