No bones were broken but a most painful bruise which has laid him up since is the result.

Fatal Accident.—On Monday afternoon last as the ballast train on the Midland was unloading in the neighbourhood of the town line between Mariposa and Eldon, one of the laborers named McCutcheon, of Lindsay, went between the engine, which was standing some feet away from the cars, to level some gravel; while thus occupied the engine suddenly backed up crushing the unfortunate man between the tender and the flat car. Medical assistance was immediately procured but the internal injuries he had received were too severe and he died early next morning. Deceased was a single man aged 22 years.

MANILLA.
