AFTER repeated trials at Paris, it has been decided that twenty eggs count as a kilogramme, or 2 1/5 pounds. The breeds of fowls that lay large eggs, averaging seven to a pound, are L.-Fleche, Houdans, Creve-Coeurs and Black Spanish; those laying medium-sized eggs, averaging eight or nine to the pound, are Leghorns, Cochins, Brahmas, Polands, Dorkins, Games, and Sultans; the Hamburgs lay about ten to the pound. The weight of the eggs of ducks is from two to three ounces apiece; turkeys, three to four ounces, the eggs of the goose, from four to six ounces.
