OSHAWA has no band.

KIRKFIELD offers \$150 in prizes for the various games on July 1st.

New potatoes were dug on the evening of the 11th in Oshawa.

Messrs Frank Henry and Wm. McCaskill, two promising young men of Brock, have gone to New Orleans.

\$100 has been granted by the Ontario County Council for improving the boundary line between Brock and Maryosa.

A RETIRED Whithy farmer is about to start a sugar refinery on a small scale. He intends purchasing a sugar crusher for extracting the juice from the sorghum.

THE annual picnic in connection with Zion Sunday school, Brock, will be held in Turner's grove, one of the most beautiful points on Lake Simcoe, on Friday, the 17th inst.

THE legislative School grant for Brock for this year is \$589; for Thorah \$322. It is necessary to levy a corresponding amount on each municipality.

MR. C. H. BURLING of Cartwright, has purchased from Mr. D. Ross of Cannington, the grist mill situated on the 10th con. This mill has been idle for a number of years, and the dam and machinery have got considerable out of repair. A grist mill in that section will be a great convenience to a large number of farmers.

A REMARKABLE accident occurred at Hamilton on the 8th inst. The marker at the rifle range happening to step from behind the butt, was struck by a bullet fired from a distance of a thousand yards. The bullet passed through his body and struck the bull's eye. The accident, it is hoped, will not prove fatal.

A BARRIE man insisted on paying one of the circus hangers on \$20 for a \$5 lot of soap, in which he thought there was \$50. He refused the \$20 back for his chance, and went off to gloat over his bargain alone. In a short time he returned and announced his readiness to sell the soap for nothing and give himself with it.

THE Barrie annual regatta, intended to take place on 1st August, is likely to attract more than usual interest. Among the prizes, the winning of the cup, worth \$200 is of course the chief feature. It has been won once by the Peterboro' club, and once by the Argonauts of Toronto. It must be won twice to entitle the winners to ownership.

THE Whithy, Port Perry and Lindsay Railway Company, in order to connect directly with the Sault line, intend to lose no time in extending their line northward from Manilla, to connect at or near Beaver-ton. They also propose to build simultaneously the branch to Uxbridge. About 22 miles of road—14 from Manilla north, and 8 miles from the Summit to Uxbridge—are all that would be required to be built.

A FURIOUS wind storm, attended with heavy thunder and lightning, set in on Monday night about eight o'clock, and raged with great violence for about an hour. A good deal of damage was done to signs sheet and fencing, and in some places crops were prostrated. The only serious accident in town was the blowing out of the south gable of the South Ward School, a fact which does not speak very well for the solidity of its construction.—Peterboro' Times.

THE Orillia Packet tells of a number of persons who were duped by swindlers at the circus which visited that place one day last week. One unfortunate man who gave a \$5 note to one of the ticket-agents for an "entertainment" on Monday afternoon, got eighty cents and two ten cent tickets. The note had changed into \$1 "by a simple twist of the wrist." Another individual invested forty-five dollars in seven valueless cakes of soap, on Monday, because he believed the vendor had wrapped up a much larger sum with them.

NIAGARA county, N. Y., has shipped 1,500,000 barrels of apples to Europe during the past year.

THE International Telegraph Company, with a capital of ten millions, has been organized in New York.

Mr. Gladstone is said to be preparing a scheme for the reduction of the interest on the national debt.

SUNDAY'S storm in Iowa was a terrible one. The loss of property and life from wind, rain, and lightning was frightful.

LADY FLORENCE Dixie, a daring literary Amazonian, is among the Boers, getting material for a book about them.

The city of Winnipeg has invested \$14,500 in a site for the new Syndicate passenger depot for the Canada Pacific Railway.
