However, we do not think many suck men as the writer of the above exist in the Township and certainly but few who would so honestly tell us that we have battled for the village interests and justice. It is recognized that Beaverton has been an this assistance without grumbling, but the time has come when the interests of the village must also be considered, and it is but reasonable to suppose that the people of the village know best wherein its interests lay. We took this view of the case and done our best to assist the movement of Incorporation. In this we believe we have done our duty and should we fail to receive any further support from the Township in consequence of this action we would still hold the same conviction. We do not fear this result however, our circulation we are pleased to know is among intelligent and rassonable men and as in the past we shall endeavour to support the interests of both communities to the best of our ability. We feel quite safe in asserting, that the views expressed by the indvidual whose remark we have quoted extend to but few of the people of the township and that the cordial relations which have always existed will be continued in spite of a few who would endeavour to provoke a casus belli.

### WOODVILLE RAILWAY DEBT

THE new municipality of Woodville and its Council will have but few questions of more importance to deal with than the Railway Debt. It is a complicated mess and the quicker it is the matter in abeyance is but making the matter worse, and prompt action will relieve the village mind immense-We have no less than two bonuses to provide for : on the Eldon side of the village we have a township bonus to the Toronto & Nippissing Railway, while on the Mariposa side a County bonus is being paid to the Whitby & Port Perry Railway. This will involve shrewd management that justice may be done us and the townships we deal with. In the case of Eldon we would suggest that our portion of the debt be determined and that the village do | ling. endeavour to have the Township assume the whole, we paying an annual installment equal to our just portion. This will relieve us from engaging in the re issue of new debentures to occur shortly and which is quite inevitable in the Township, and will save a large sum to us in unnecessary interest. This is the plan, we believe, adopted by Cannington in their connection with Brock and so far as we have heard the scheme works successfuly. In the case of Mariposa it is probable the County Council will deal with the matter and fix the method of paying and the amount:

Ever since the mysterious disappearance of Andrew Rolston, who left his home in March last without giving his wife or family any information with respect to why or where he was going, his departure has not, as is usual in such cases, been without its accompaniment of comment and gossip, some of which is by no means praiseworthy. It has also furnished an occasion for the advancing of many wild rumours and opinions by persons at a distance who have no other foundations for such opinions than their own vivid imaginations and who are totally void of, any regard or sympathy for the sore feelings and discomfiture which must be experienced by a wife and family so deprived. Out of justice however, to the bereaved family, who have the sympathy of the entire neighbourhood, let it be said that these opinions are held by the neighbours of the family in just contempt. One of these rumours was proved unfounded by a party consisting of sixteen of the neighbours, who made a thorough search of a small piece of swamp in the vicinity, on Saturday of last week; but with the result which they expected of finding no trace of the missing man. The men who took part in this search were not actuated by the feeling that their labor would be rewarded by any discovery, (for the opinion generally entertained by them is, that Mr. Rolston has gone abroad for the purpose of ed. accumulating a fortune and may be yet heard from.) but that others who say much and do little might be satisfied. And now Mr. Editor, I ask as a favor the publication of this item in your paper.

Appeals were received against the assess ment from the following persons :-- John A. Jackson, that he did not own the property for which he was assessed. This was amended by placing the property on the Non Resident list.

Hugh Wilson of Cannington appealed against his assessment and stated that his personal propert was assessed too high and made a declaration that his stock was \$4,200 and that he was indebted for the same \$3,. 770 and he was only liable to be assessed for \$400, the Council amended accordingly.

#### Ontario |County Council. FOURTH DAY.

FRIDAY JUNE 6TIL. The Warden took the chair at 10:50 a.m. The Clerk laid before the Council the bonds of the County Treasurer.

Mr. Long, chairman, presented the first report of the standing committee on County Property and Gaol Management, which with a few slight amendments was adopted.

The usual by-law to raise money, not exceeding \$12,000, etc., to meet the current year's expenses, was passed.

Mr. A. McRae brought in a by law to incorporate the village of Beaveaton, together wifh a report from the census taker, and on the motion of Mr. Larke seconded by Mr. A. McRae, they were referred to a special committee consisting of Messrs. Murron, A. McRae, McPherson, Thompson and St. John, who reported in favor of the adoption of the by-law and the report from the census commissioner. On motion the name of George Smith, Jr. was inserted in the bylaw as Returning Officer. Report adopt-

On motion of Mr. Philip McRae, twenty dollars was ordered to be paid to James Gordon, census commissioner of Beaverton.

Mr. Jas. McPherson, chairman, brought up the second report of the standing committee on Roads and Bridges.

The report recommends payment of the following accounts :- W. Rodman, repairs Scugog bridge, \$86.31; Thos. Doucett caretaker Talbot bridge, salary 1884, \$5.00; D. Graham, removing flood wood, Talbot bridge, \$12.00; P. McRae, 2 dys, services as com. Taibot bridge, \$4.00; Gould Hazard, salary 1884 as caretaker Severn bridge,

That having learned that nearly all that por tion of Seugog bridge better known as the Ireland contract has this spring as well as last been under water in consequence of the sinking of the same, recommend that that portion of said bridge be raised to a height equal with and repaired in a manner similar to that already done by the contractor Mr. Themum and that W Lateman reeve of Seugog; P. A motion of Mr. P. McRae that a clause be added to the report, authorizing the payment of. 845 to the commissioners appointed to remove obstructions from the outlets of lakes Simcre and Couchiching, was lost. Report adopted as

On motion of Mr. Batemen, \$300 was put to the credit of Scugog bridge commission.

Mr. Larke, chairman, brought up a report from the Finance Committee.

The committee had before it the bond of J. B. Laing as Treasurer and the engagement of the London Guarantee Co., as his strety, and found them in same state as at Jan. session, and found that the bonds and engagement as above expire on June 24th inst., and recommend that they be renewed before that date, said renewal to be satisfactory to the Warden and chairman of this committee. The committee had before it the members of the special committee to ascertain the amount to be paid by the Government under the Present sys em of steam heating, who states that the Inspector of Prisons has recently examined into the master which is now under the consideration of the Government with a fair prospect of our claim being soon satisfied. The committee recommends that the County Treasurer and Auditors be instructed to grrange asystem of subheads under which the receipts and expenditures of the County shall be placed in the estimates of the former and reports of the latter as submitted.
