

Victoria County Council.

JUNE SESSION.

The June session of the Victoria county council began Tuesday afternoon, the warden in the chair. The following gentlemen were present and answered to the roll: Messrs. Broad, Cameron, Daniel, Eyres, Fairbairn, Fee, Fell, Hopkins, Hunt, Kennedy, McArthur, McEachern, McMurray, Norris, Road, Taylor and Walker.

The clerk stated that Dr. Clark, the reeve of the new municipality of Woodville, had filed his certificates with him and taken the customary declaration.

The minutes of the former sessions were duly read and confirmed.

Col. Deacon and Mr. Millar entered and took their seats.

REPORTS.

The warden read the auditor's report for the past financial year, which was referred to the committee, also the estimates for the present year.

The reports of the inspectors of east and west Victoria school divisions were also read and referred to the education committee.

The following communications were then read:—

From the president of the agricultural college, enclosing circulars for the information of council.

From the reeve of Omeme, respecting the decay and dangerous condition of the bridge across Pigeon river on King street.

From the reeve of Bexley, respecting necessary repairs needed on Grass river bridge north of Victoria Road village.

From manager of Bank of Montreal, respecting rate of interest for discounts.

From R. W. Phipps, clerk of, forest preservation, respecting forests.

From the clerk of the Legislative Assembly, submitting questions respecting constitution of county councils.

From the trustees and a number of rate-payers in school section No. 12, Verulam, asking that a committee be appointed under sec. 88 of the school act to attach certain lots to said section.

From the secretary of the department of public works, Ottawa, acknowledging receipt of petition respecting public buildings in the town of Lindsay.

Dr. Norris moved, seconded by Mr. McEachern that Messrs. Fell, Deacon, Fairbairn and Broad be a committee to inspect the bridge on Pigeon river, and report to the council not later than Thursday next the condition of said bridge.—Carried.

Mr. Kennedy moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, that Messrs. Fairbairn, Bailey (Emily), Walker, Adam, Melville, McArthur, McEachern, Bailey (Laxton), Hunt, Norris, Fell, Brown, Taylor and Dr. Clarke be a special committee for equalizing the assessment rolls of the several municipalities to form a basis for levying county rates for the current year.—Carried.

Mr. Fell moved, seconded by Col. Deacon that the communication from the Ontario Government respecting amendments to the municipal laws so far as regard bridges and representation of municipalities in county councils be referred to a committee composed of Col. Deacon and Messrs. Adams, Hunt, Norris, Fairbairn and the mover, and that the Committee report during the present session.—Carried.

The council then adjourned until ten o'clock to-morrow.

Council met at three o'clock, the warden in the chair.

All the members present except Messrs. Daniel, Heaslip and Hopkins.

Minutes read and adopted.

Communications were received and read as follows:

From the clerk county Simcoe, asking that a grant of \$100 be made for the building of a bridge on the town line between Watt and Stephenson as the county of Simcoe had done.

A petition from the municipal council of Draper and Oakley, praying that a grant be made to assist in building a new bridge across the Black river in Oakley.

The name of Dr. Clarke, of Woodville, was on motion of Col. Deacon placed on the education committee.

Mr. R. McMurray moved, seconded by Mr. McClelland, that the plans of a bridge on the boundary of Draper and Oakley be laid on the table, which was done.

On motion of Mr. Parker, seconded by Mr. Fell, \$100 was granted to the new bridge between Watt and Stephenson, on condition the county of Simcoe do the same.

The report of the special committee on the Pigeon river bridge reported, recommending that a new bridge be erected, as the present one was in a very dilapidated and unsafe condition. They suggested that a new structure be erected with stone abutments and iron superstructure of one span, which is about 60 feet in length. The village would undertake to construct the approach free of expense to the county in case the bridge be rebuilt of iron. They further considered it necessary that prompt action be taken, and would recommend that the county engineer be instructed to prepare plans and specifications for stone work, etc., and with as little delay as possible to complete it this season.

The report was adopted.

Mr. Tooke moved, seconded by Mr.

Parker, that \$100 be granted by this council for the erection of a bridge across the outlet from Deer lake on the town line between Stephenson and Macaulay, and that this motion be referred to the road and bridge committee.—Carried.

Dr. Norris moved, seconded by Mr. Kennedy, that the chairman of the road and bridge committee, Mr. Adam, and the reeves of Lindsay, Omeme, Verulam and Emily be a special committee to obtain plans and specifications for the bridge over Pigeon river at Omeme, to advertise and receive tenders, and to let contracts in accordance with the report of the special committee.—Carried.

Mr. Cameron moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, that this council grant \$100 to erect a bridge across the Talbot river in Eldon at the village of Balsover, and that this resolution be referred to the committee on roads and bridges.—Carried.

Mr. Walker moved, seconded by Mr. Melville, that the sum of \$1,000 be granted to improve the following leading roads to the county town, viz: Between Oakwood and Lindsay, \$150; between Omeme and Lindsay, \$200; between Lindsay and Little Britain, \$200; between Lindsay and Dunsford, \$250, between Lindsay and Downeyville, \$200; and that this motion be referred to the committee on roads and bridges.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Fee, seconded by Col. Deacon that \$50 be granted to Lindsay for repairs to Wellington street bridge, and that this resolution be referred.—Carried.

Mr. Eyres moved, seconded by Mr. McEachern, that this council grant \$500 to be extended in opening up a road between lots 10 and 11, in the 6th con. of Mariposa, and that this resolution be referred.—Carried.

Mr. Bailey moved, seconded by Mr. Miller, that this council grant \$200 for the improvement of the crossway on the 6th con. between lots 12 and 13, being the centre road of Emily, and that this motion be referred.—Carried.

Col. Deacon moved, seconded by Mr. McArthur, that the following be a special committee to draft a petition to the Honorable the Minister of Railways and Canals praying that the Dominion Parliament may before or at the next session of the Legislature prepare and mature a scheme for the purpose of recouping those municipalities which granted aid to the different lines of railway in the same manner as in the Pembroke case, and somewhat similar to that received by the municipalities in the lower province at the late session of the Parliament of Canada, viz: Messrs. Adam, Walker, McEachern, McArthur, Fell, Fairbairn, Daniel, Bailey (Emily), and the mover.—Carried.

Col. Deacon moved, seconded by Mr. Fairbairn, that the following be a special committee to report at the December session of this council, 1st, whether it is expedient to construct certain gravel roads in the country; 2nd, if expedient where such roads are to be located; 3rd, the grade and engineering facilities; 4th, the probable cost of the same; 5th, the mode of financing for the payment of such sum as may be agreed upon, viz: Messrs. Walker, Adam, Bailey (Emily), Daniel, Bailey (Laxton), McEachern, Fell, McArthur, Reid, and the mover and second.—Carried.

The council adjourned till ten o'clock Thursday morning.
