The Woodville Council met on 20th June, 1884 pursuant to adjournment as a Court of Revision. Members all present.

The reeve in the chair. Minutes of last Council were read and confirmed.

The clerk stated that he sent notices to all parties who the assessor complained against as not being properly assessed.

Moved by Mr. Grant seconded by Mr. Degeer that the assessments in error be confirmed on personal property as follows: John Scott, \$300; McIntyre and Prior, \$1,000; Rod. Campbell, \$500; W. G. Smith & Co., \$600; Leas & McDonald, \$400; A. Gunn \$600; J. C. Gilchrist, \$200 on stock and \$200 on grain store house.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Degeer, seconded by Mr. McArthur, that the time for the commutation of Statute Labor at 75cents per day be extended to first of July next.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Degeer, seconded by Mr. McArthur that the alterations made in Statute Labor be confirmed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Degeer, that the Assessment Roll for 1884 as now amended be adopted.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. McArthur, seconded by Mr. Campbell that the Reeve be authorized to grant his order to pay the following accounts: Jas. Campbell & Son for Harrison's Municipal Manual and postage, \$7.13; also for minute-books and express charges, \$1.45; J. J. Cave for election, Stationery \$5.25; C. Scadding for 25 dog tags, \$1.60; Kinnon, Tingley & Stewart for seal, \$6.00; express charges on seal, \$0.25; P. Campbell assessor, \$5.00; W. W. Armstrong repairing sidewalks, \$15.00.—Carried.
