A Beaverton Boy Abroad.

Impressions of Wisconsin and Minnesota.

Ashland is situated on the shores of Lake Superior about 75 miles from Duluth. Most probably there is not one of my Beaverton friends has ever heard of the place before, but it is not more than two months ago since there was a boom here that for wildness of speculation almost equalled the famous Winnipeg Boom. Until a week ago I had never heard tell of the place myself, but at present it is the spot in which Providence has cast my lot for a short time coming almost direct here from Canada. The manner of living is extremely hard to fall in with, and every thing is so different to what we have been used to. This town presents a curious appearance to a stranger with all the features present, in a very large degree, which are so prominent in booming Western towns viz.—Saloons, Hotels and Real Estate Offices. The town consists of one long street extending over two miles along the Lake shore, and I don't suppose there is a farm within 20 miles. The forest encroaches right up to the Main street. It is hard for a stranger to find out where on earth the "boom" came from. But Americans have a peculiar knack of raising "booms" where other people would see nothing but barrenness. The very atmosphere of this country is permeated with the "boom" fever, and a city or town that has not got one is "away back." Ashland has had hers, Duluth has one, St. Paul's has one, Fargo, Bismarck, Jamestown, Minneapolis, Omaha, Sioux City and St. Joseph are all booming away in great style. The newspapers published in these respective towns indulge in genuine American Bombast and Spread Eagleism regarding the "wonderful progress" they were making, and "This City is destined in a few years to be one of the greatest in the Union, etc. etc." suffices to say of all the towns and cities I've been in since coming here. There is not one that is making such substantial progress as our own Toronto, when an American newspaper estimates the population of "this great and progressive city" at 150,000 inhabitants then you will be perfectly safe to put it down at 100,000. The tendency to exaggerate seems born in the average American citizen, if a person was to swallow all they hear and read about this country, they would eat all they would see. Happening to take up the St. Paul "Globe," the first article to catch my eye was entitled, "An English game of doing injury to the Commerce of the United States." The article contains a few facts and an uncommon amount of "Rot." It recounts an interview with a Major Peabody, a great American railway authority, and among a great many other things he says that, "Emissaries of England had a hand in the devising of the inter-state commerce bill as it could not be framed better for ruining the commerce of this country, and places us in the commercial power of Canada." Regarding the C. P. R., he said, "Retaliation is in Canada's eye, and her Canadian Pacific will carry cereals and all other merchandise for nearly nothing, and lose money all the time for the sake of weakening the roads of this country." Of course this is not of the worst type, still it is conceded all over this country that the C. P. R. is reaping immense benefit from the inter-state bill, in another place he says, "we are at the mercy of England in a commercial sense just as well as in a naval sense," then there is a whole column filled up in the same style. There is a great deal of interest taken over here in the movements of editor, O'Brien, full double-headed column appearing every day with account of his movements, and editorials written in red hot condemnation of the "heartless tyrant, Lord Lansdowne." Americans as well as Canadians have to keep the weather eye open for the Irish vote. Charles Dickens' estimate of "the great American people" with their bombast about "our institutions" etc. etc., is not in my opinion the least overdrawn. Nearly every person has read his description in "Martin Chuzzlewit" of the American's dining. Their customers have not changed since his time. As soon as the dinner bell rings there is a mad stampede made in the direction of the dining hall. The onlooker is almost forced to the conclusion that they have like Dr. Tanner, been fasting on pump water for a week or so. Mechanics get very good wages up here, bricklayers in St. Paul's getting \$4 to \$5 per day. Laborers, however can do better in Toronto or any of our Canadian cities, as living is so very high here that the excess of wages paid will not pay the difference in the price of living, forty dollars in Ontario is as good as thirty here. A suit of clothes which in Ontario would cost fifteen or twenty dollars could not be bought here for less than thirty or thirty-five dollars. I suppose to-day (the 24th) you will be having an expensive time over there,

celebrating the Queen's Birthday, it seems strange to have the day pass and excite no comment.

Our Village Fathers.

May 18th 1887. The council met at 7 o'clock p. m. Members all present. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Petitions presented: James Cameron and fifteen others for sidewalk and drainage improvement on Simcoe street east of York street; F. Stewart and 8 others for constructing a drain from Franklin street to the railway ditch on Lot 18 Con. 6. Communications read from R. C. Strickland re. Trent valley canal. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Campbell, that the sum of \$25.00 be paid to Mr. Lachlan Cameron in aid of supporting the village band.—Carried. Mr. Roger Thompson was heard re. his account for cutting ice and letting off water on Main street. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott, that in the matter of the account of Mr. R. Thompson, this council consider Mr. Thompson has been paid for all the work ordered by the commissioner and decline to allow anything more.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Proctor, seconded by Mr. Young, that the sum of \$50.00 be granted to aid in making a drain on Franklin street and outlet therefrom said drain and outlet tube laid with 6 inch tile and to be constructed in such a manner that it will have sufficient fall to carry off water, 4 inches below the level of the ground where Franklin street intersects Mara road and the tube carried thence easterly along Franklin street to the eastern extremity of said street at a depth of 4 feet 6 inches, said outlet to commence at a given point on the railway track, the drain to be completed to the satisfaction of the village commissioner and the money to be paid to the contractor on his certificate that the drain is so completed.—Carried. The petition of James Cameron and others was ordered to be laid over until the next meeting when the matter of public improvements would be considered. Moved by Mr. Young seconded by Mr. Westcott that this council do now adjourn until Friday the 27th day of May 1887 to meet at 7 p. m. and then to hold a Court of Revision.—Carried.

May 27th 1887. The Council met as adjourned from last meeting. The members all present. After taking and subscribing the oath the members formed a Court of Revision to hear and decide the following appeals: Alexander Calder, assessed too high, appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed; Dun. Gillespie, assessed too high, appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed; H. Waller, assessed too high, appeal dismissed and assessment confirmed; Wm. Turner, assessed too high, appeal allowed and assessment reduced to \$300.00; G. Smith, jr., to have lot 44 S. Bay St. assessed to himself, appeal allowed; A. Sackett, to have the dog assessed to him on roll assessed to John Gordon, appeal allowed. Moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Campbell, that this court do now adjourn until June 13th to meet at 7 p. m. to allow the assessor to add a number of dogs to the roll which have been omitted.—Carried. Council proceedings:—A petition presented from Wm. Smith and about 50 others praying that a new sidewalk be constructed on Bay street, petition laid over until next meeting when it is intended to make the appropriations for street improvement. Communications received from James Stevenson re. Trent valley canal, no action taken. Moved by Mr. Proctor, seconded by Mr. Campbell, that 50 copies of the detailed and abstract accounts be printed in pamphlet form, provided the cost does not exceed \$8.00 and that no further advertising be necessary.—Carried. The following accounts were laid on the table and ordered to be paid:—John Cameron, assessor, on account salary, \$10.00; Dan. McInnis, 1 day repairing plank, \$1.25; H. Musgrove, 1 day repairing sidewalk, 62 cents; clerk for messenger sending notices Court of Revision, 75 cents. On motion the Council adjourned until June 13th to meet after the Court of Revision. **GEORGE SMITH** jr., Village Clerk.
