Board of Health.

The Board met as adjourned, present the Chairman, Secretary and Messrs. Glassford and Cave. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. Moved by Mr. Cave, seconded by Mr. Glassford, that whereas it is important in the interest of the public health and in the present condition of the river to take some action with the view of cleansing the bed of the same, that the Chairman, Secretary and mover be a committee to wait on Messrs. Dobson & Campbell and learn their intentions in the re-building of the dam and endeavour to have a sluice gate placed in the same so that means may be available to flush the bed at time of high water and let all deposits now prevented by the dam pass down to the lake and report at the next meeting. Carried. Moved by Mr. Glassford, seconded by Mr. Cave, that the attention of the village council be called to the sunken floodwood now uncovered by the breaking of the dam and urge upon them the necessity of causing the said floodwood to be removed as soon as possible. Carried. The Inspector reported his inspection as uncompleted and was requested to prepare a report for next meeting. On motion the Board adjourned to meet on Monday, June 13th, at 8 o'clock, p. m.
