Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser that two steel scrapers be obtained from Mr. William Smith of Beaverton and delivered to Mr. Christopher J. McRae and Mr. John Morrison, one to each, who are to be held responsible for the same as pathmasters of the township.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Morrison, seconded by Mr. Galloway that the Road Commisioner be instructed to deepen the ditch at Wm. McArthur's gate between 3rd and 4th con., lot 9, sufficiently to carry the water from that point to the gully.—Carried. A number of accounts were presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Mr. Galloway, seconded by Mr. Fraser that the amended tender of Mr. Louis M. Hayes for the Township debentures be laid over for further consideration until Wednesday the 30th day of May and that explanations be requested from the parties tendering in the same manner as Messrs. Hall & Hayes. -Carried. Moved by Mr. Fraser, seconded by Mr. Morrison that the Council do now adjourn until Wednesday the 30th day of May, A. D. 1888, to meet at 6 o'clock, p. m.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Campbell that appropriations be made for the following improvements of streets and sidewalks, viz.: On Main and Mara Streets from bridge to Methodist church, a new sidewalk 6 feet wide; on Victoria street extension of old sidewalk and gravelling; on Mill and part of Simcoe streets from John Proctor's to Bay street, a new 6 ft. sidewalk; on Simcoe street west towards lake, 90 rods of new 4 ft. sidewalk; on Simcoe street east extension to pass culvert west of Gillespie's gate a 4 ft. sidewalk; at H. West's cutting and levelling hill on Simcoe street gravelling westward from John street; on Franklin street turnpiking as may be found necessary.-Carried. Moved by Mr Young, seconded by Mr. Westcott that the account of Jno. A. Cartwright of \$25 for preparing bill and attending same for legislation re. municipal debentures be paid and that of that sum be charged to the Corporation of Thorah.-Carried. Moved by Mr. Westcott, seconded by Mr. Campbell that Mr. Jas. C. Edgar be granted \$10 towards compensation for his loss sustained in his late contract, repairing the bridge.—Carried. Moved by Mr. Young, seconded by Mr. Campbell that this Council do now adjourn to meet on Friday, May 25th, at 7 o'clock, p. m .-Carried.


