WE CAN'T GO,

For some time past we have been considering the question as to whether connection with our great and flourishing neighbours to the South would not be the best thing for Canada and we had almost reached the conclusion that it would when along came the report of Senator Schultz's committee which was appointed by the House of Commons to enquire into the resources of the Great McKenzie Basin. It has knocked our conclusions on the American connection point into a cocked hat. A people with a county in reserve of such vast resources as is pictured by this report need have no fears as to the future and we can't see our way over to the American line just now. A contemporary in summing up the report says: "The report on the resources of the Great McKenzie Basin has somewhat startled ourselves as well as our British cousins over the sea as to the magnitude of the heritage we possess. That Committee report that the extent of the region is 1,260,000 square miles; that its coast line on the Arctic Ocean and Hudson's Bay measures 5,000 miles, over one-half of it being equally accessible to whaling and sealing craft; that the navigable coast lines of the larger lakes of the region extend for 4,000 miles; that river navigation is practicable for 2,750 miles; that within the region there is a possible area of 656,000 square miles fit for potato growing, 407,000 suitable for the cultivation of barley and 316,000 for that of wheat; that the pastoral area is equal to 800,000 square miles; that 150,000 square miles are ariferous, and that the evidence submitted to the committee points to the existence in the Athabasca and Mackenzie valleys of the most extensive petroleum field on the American continent, or in the world. They report that they have reason to believe that a comparison of the capabilities of this region shows that it exceeds, in the extent of its navigable waters, in the area of arable and pastoral lands, in valuable fresh water fisheries, in its forests, and in its capacity to support population, the countries of Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, Austria, and part of France and Russia.

Lord Stanley was sworn in as Governor-General on Tuesday.

President Cleveland has been unanimously nominated by the Democratic Party to contest the coming Presidential election.

Petitions are being circulated in Ontario County for the repeal of the Scott Act. They are being numerously signed.

The Honor of Knighthood was to have been conferred on Dr. Daniel Wilson, president of Toronto University, but the Dr. declined the honor on the ground that he preferred his present title to the new.

The floating of the Canadian Pacific bonds in London was a remarkable success. Ten times the amount asked was subscribed by eleven o'clock, and the bonds were afterwards quoted at a premium of 4 to 4 1/2.

Chicago has fallen into line with New York and has elected a woman as member of the Board of Education. There does not seem to be any reason why women should not make very good school trustees, and there are several reasons why they might be superior to men.
