The train will leave Coboconk at 6 a. m., and Woodville at 7.30. The fare from all stations north of the Junetion, to Toronto, is 80 cents; south of the Junction, 60 cents. Fare to Miagara, \$1.50 and \$1.25, good to return until the 8th. Arrangements are being made at Niagara for cheap lodgings, and everything will be done for the comfort of excursionists.

Obituary. - again are we called upon to record the death of a much-lamented friend and brother, through the demise of Mr. Wm. John Ashman, eldest son of Wm. Ashman, Esq., Deputy-Reeve of Eldon. For some time the deceased bad been suffering from a derangement of the liver, but kept steadily at his work-until about five weeks ago, when he was forced to take to his bed, from

which he never afterwards arose. On Friday morning he breathed his last. He was buried on Saturday in the Eden cemetery, with Orange honors. Although but short notice was given, the funeral procession that followed the remains to the grave, was the largest ever seen in the County of Victoria, and there was scarcely a dry eye in the vast assemblage as the corpse was carried from the house, preceeded by the Band playing the "Dead March." Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Ashman, this being the first breach that death has made in their family circle.

A BY-LAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE BRAIN. ING: OF CERTAIN LANDS IN THE TOWN-SHIPS OF MARIPOSA AND ELDON, AND FOR BORROWING ON THE CREDIT OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF MARIPOSA THE SUM OF \$1998.58 FOR COMPLETING THE SAME.

Provisionally adopted the Seventh day of July, A. D. 1879

THEREAS, a majority in number of the VV owners, as shown by the last Revised Assessment Rolls, of the property hereinafter set forth to be benefitted by the drainage of said lands, have petitioned the Council of the said Township of Mariposa praying that said Council would take the necessary steps to drain certain lands, embracing part of Lots Nos. 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14, in the 15th Concession of Mariposa, and Lot No. 1 in the 5th Concession, and Lot No. 1 in the 6th Concession of Eldon, and for procuring the necessary funds therefor in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act, Capy 174, of the Revised Statutes of Ontario, in order that certain lands situate in the Townships of Mariposa and Eldon may be improved by said work.

AND WHEREAS, thereupon the said Council procured an examination to be made by James Dickson, Esquire, Provincial Land Surveyor, being a person competent for such purpose, of the said locality proposed to be drained, and has also procured Plans and Estimates of the work to be made by the said James Dickson and an assessment to be made by him of the real property to be benefitted by such drainage, stating as nearas he can the proportion of benefit which in his opinion will be derived in consequence of such drainage by every road and lot or portion of lot; the said assessment so made and the report of the said James Dickson in respect thereofand of said drainage being as follows :--
