Sin, -In THE ADVOCATE of last week I observe a notice by the Secretary of the Eldon Branch Agricultural Society, calling on parties wishing to become members to immediately hand in their names. This notice is right, but would have been more timely had it been earlier, but in order to make the fall show a grand success, much more is required of the officers of the Society and others interested than a notice in a newspaper. Canvassing and hard work will have to be done, if they have a large membership roll and a good exhibit. Having spent 46 years of my life in that neighbour. ciety for many years, and for several o these years one of its directors, I feel an interest in its prosperity, and as times are getting better. I hope that farmers and and make it more successful than it has been in the past. The prize list ought to Le revised. The Scotch and Club wheats have for several years been degenerating, and I think prizes for these wheats should be discontinued and other wheats substituted in their place. There are several varieties which stand well among many agriculturists. Among these are the White Russian, the White Fife, the Lost Nation and Aranecta, There is a new variety coming before the public, scalled the French spring wheat, which is supposed by many who are qualified to judge, will soon stand high in public lavor for yield and for milling qualities. Such as the above and other new varieties should be encouraged, instead of old varieties which have lost their usefulness. I think it would be well to discontinue giving prizes to grade male animals, more especially to grade bulls, and thereby discourage the raising of inferior stock. There ought to be an alteration or addition to the prize list as regards the class of horses, and if the resources of the Society can permit there ought to be several additions to the prize list, and which I ere long hope to see. But all this and more depends on the energy and enterprise of the officers of the Society. 
