THE abandonment of Cyprus by the British Government has to all intents and purposes been decided upon. The Premier is, however, afraid to blurt out the announcement, and so he and his colleagues and the Liberal papers are preparing the public mind for the news by dilating on the unhealthiness of the climate, its uselessness and the incurable bankruptcy of its treasury. Ministerial journals suggest that if Greece does not want it it had better be given back to the Turks.

THE Russian Foreign Office is credit ed with a very astute design for gaining the upper hand in Asia. Arms are to be put aside for the time being, and every effort is to be concentrated on the establishment of Russian influ ence. This change of policy is said to have been due to a remark of General Skobeloff, that "backsheesh" will do far more work than breechloaders now that Russia has drawn near to Afghanistan on two sides. Instead, therefore, of spending vast sums in campaigns, liberal largesse will be distributed in influential circles at Constantinople, Teheran and Cabul, while the capitals of the minor States in Central Asia will also benefit by Russian gold.

THE effect of the agitation in Ireland upon the rental of land in England may be learned from a return recently issued. In North Wilts a large area of land is out of cultivation, and 10,000 acres are let to one man on nearly the sole condition that he keeps them from weeds. All through Lincolnshire farms may be had for the asking, tenants being asked merely to pay rates and taxes In Gloucestershire, a small parish let three years ago for £2,000 only fetches £1 -000 to-day. In Hertford, farms of 400 acres, and upwards are held on the solitary condition that as the landlord pays all the charges, the tenants will keep the farms cultivated. In Bedfordshire all new leases are from 50 to 75 per ct. below old rates. The fall in Essex is 40 per ct., and in Somerset 35 per ct One farm in South Wiltshire which recently gave the landlord £700 a year. has just been let at £450, and in West Sussex 5,000 acres have been going a begging for the last fifteen months. In Voncestershire there are scores of big estates, where not more than one, or at most two, out of the whole number are occupied.
