Township of Thorah. BY-LAW NO. 7 of 1884.

A by-law to re-arrange the polling subdivisions of the Township to appoint the place for holding the meeting for the nomination of candidates for the Municip F Council and also to appoint the place for holding the meetings of Council and for transacting the business of the corporation,

The corporation of the township of Thorah enacts that from and after passing of this by-law the Polling Sub-Divisions of the township of Thorah shall be composed as follows: that is to say Polling Sub Division. number one shall consist of the whole of the 1st and 2nd Concessions of the 3rd Concession from the Centre Road to the Lake of the 4th and 5th Concessions, from the divi ing line between lots 13 and 14 to the limits of the village of Beaverton, thence along the said limits of Beaverton to the Lake Shore.

Polling Sub.-Division number two shallconsist of the 3rd Concession from the Townline between Thorah and Eldon to the Centre Road.

The 4th Concession from the townline between Thorah and Eldon to the dividing line between lots 13 and 14. The 5th Concession from the townline between Thorah and Eldon to the limits of the village of Beaver ton and following the said limits to the dividing line between lots 13 and 14. The 6th Concession from the townline of Thorak and Eldon to the Centre Road.

Polling Sub-Division number three shall consist of the 6th Concession from the Centre Road to the limits of the village of Beaverton and following the said limits to the Lake, of Thorah Island and of the whole of the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th and 11th Concessions.

And Polling Sub-Division number four shall consist of the incorporated village of Beaverton, that the place for holding the meeting for the nomination of candidates for the Municipal Council shall be the School house in School Section number three, and the place for holding the meetings of the Council for transacting the business of the Corporation and keeping the Township's office shall be the Town Hall in aforesaid village of Beaverton,

Passed on Saturday the 14th day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eighthundred and eighty four.
