Mariposa Township Council.

Council met this 7th day of July, 1884.
Members all present. Minutes of last meet-
ing read and approved.

Moved by Mr. Wallis, seconded by Mr.
Broad, that this Council grant to S. H.
Metherell, the sum of ten dollars for re-
pairing the sidewalk on east side of the
Bridge across the creek in the village of
Little Britain. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Broad, seconded by Mr.
Bowes, that this Council grant the sum of
twenty-five dollars on the town-line between
Brock and Mariposa, north of the 14th Con.
of this Township, on condition that Brock
grant a like sum and that the Clerk com-
municate with the township of Brock
through their Clerk requesting them to
grant a like amount, and that R. Adams be
commissioner to act jointly with a commis-
sioner appointed by the municipality of
Brock to expend the same. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Eyres, seconded by Mr.
Bowes, that the Clerk be and is hereby
instructed to give public notice in some
journal published in or near this munic-
ipality that this Council will at its next sit-
ting to be held on Monday the 11th day of
August next pass a by-law to lease the
original road allowance between Lots 20
and 21 in the 8th Con., reserving one rod
to be used as a foot path. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr.
Wallis, that Edwin Rogers be and is hereby
appointed Commissioner to expend the sum of
\$2.50 on the 17th Con. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr.
Eyres, that the Reeve give his order on the
Treasurer in favor of Henry Oliver in care
of T. Broad for the sum of two dollars for
furnishing cedar for sluiceway on the 3rd
Con. opposite Lot 6. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr.
Broad, that the following accounts be paid
and the Reeve give his order on the
Treasurer for the same. Jos. J. Cave ac-
per account, \$3.10; J. D. Smith, 115 loads
of gravel at 5 cents per load, \$5.75; G. W.
Beall, ac per account \$11.50. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Bowes, seconded by Mr.
Wallis, that the Reeve give his order on the
Treasurer in favor of Orlando Jewell for the
sum of \$1.75 in care of T. Broad for cedar
furnished for sluiceway on side line between
Lots 20 and 21, Con. 3. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Eyres, seconded by Mr.
Wallis, that this Council meet at the north
end of side road between lots 10 and 12 on
the 6th Con. to examine said road on Friday
the 11th inst at 2 p. m. Carried.

Moved by Mr. Wallis, seconded by Mr.
Eyres, that this Council do now adjourn to
meet again on the second Monday in August
n. xt. Carried.
