THE late rains have produced a better and more healthy business feeling among our farmer friends. The prospects of a bountiful harvest, have never been better than at present and we trust the anticipations will be fully realized.

It is too late for prevention when a dread disease is among us. Better that we prepare for an emergency even though it never come. The law demands that ever village and town shall have a Board of Health. Mone has as yet been appointed for this village and we call upon the council to comply with the law in this respect.

THAT the Asiatic cholera prevails in some places in France seems to be established beyond a doubt. It has been found by experience that this epidemic travels most usually by the routes of commerce. In 1832 it made its appearance on this continent in Canada in June; appeared in New York in' the early part of July, and in Philadel. phia in the latter part of the same month. Progressing by the water routes and avoiding elevated regions, it gradually spread through the various parts of the country. In 1849, after ies appearance in Europe, it made some impression upon the Atlantic ports of this country, and was active along the Mississippi river and its tributaries. Rigorous quarantine measures have been successful in keeping out this scourge since 1866, when a number of sporadic cases occurred, but these measures afford no absolute assurance of immunity. The individual may best avoid consagion by a temperate and orderly life, and shunning all excessess. Unripe or overripe fruit should be let alone, and vegetables, even when properly cooked, partaken of with moderation. Good beef, mutton and broad, with milk, hominy, oatmeal, bulled corn, and rice would form a safe diet. Stimulants should be avoided. Thirst is hest quenched by cold tea or weak lemonade, avoiding ice water. Whether the cholera comes or not, these simple dietic rules are worth observing, since they embody the principles of right living during the sultry months. And if the Asiatic plague should appear they furnish to each person the safest means of effectually avoiding it.
