When and How to Harvest Wheat.

It is the experience of the best wheat growers in our own and other countries that a superior quality of grain is obtained by harvesting the crop when the berry is in the soft or "doughy" state; that is when the grain may be readily crushed between the thumb and finger.

Measuring Standing Grain.

A WONDERFUL OPERATION.

The Skin of a Suicide Successfully Transferred to the Arm of a Boy.
Dr. Gardner, a surgeon attached to the staff of Bellevue Hospital, recently performed, successfully, an operation whereby he removed a large piece of skin from the body of a suicide and transplanted it upon the arm of a patient whose flesh had been denuded of its covering.

The causes that led to the operation are as wonderful as the successful issue itself. Charles Johnson, a little boy, during the summer of 1883 was struck by lightning, the electric current passed through his body, tearing off the clothing. The boy, who was sitting by an open window, was thrown to the floor, where he remained unconscious for several hours.

The operation, in the face of an article which lately appeared in a German medical paper, which described a similar case, proves that the work of the American surgeon antedated the German operation.
