Do You Use Canned Goods.

Such large quantities of canned goods are sold now, that there being some danger to good health in inferior goods, we give the following directions for testing these goods before buying, written by an expert. Reject every line of canned goods that does not show the line of resin around the edges of the seam of the can. Reject every one that does not have the name of the manufacturer or firm upon it, as well as the name of the company and the country and town where manufactured. Standards have all this. When the wholesale dealer is ashamed to have his name on the goods, fight shy of them. Press on the bottom of the can. If decomposition is setting in the tin will rattle, the same as the bottom of the oiler of your sewing machine will do. If the goods are sound it will be solid and there will be no rattle to the tin. Reject every tin that shows any sign of rust around the cap or inside of the head of the can. If housewives are educated to these points then the murmur of zinc amalgam will become a thing of the past and dealers in "swells" have to seek some other occupation.
