Editorial Notes.

(By the Editor or gathered from Exchanges.)

The "Mothers of Cannington" through the Lindsay "Post" have taken the "Gleaner" to task for its publication of the filthy evidence of the Brown-Linwood case. It is now in order for the "Gleaner" to rake up its vocabulary of choice epithets and apply them with its customary vigor to the ladies who have presumed to dictate the course it should follow.

The latest accounts from the United States confirm the rumors that Candidate Cleveland had beaten his wife within an inch of her life with a chair, and that Candidate Harrison had been caught stealing pennies out of a blind beggar's hat.

The temperance question is rapidly coming to the front, and nothing can for any great length of time, hinder its onward movement. The attention the subject is receiving from both church and state makes it plain that decisive action cannot be long delayed.—Toronto "News."

The British Admiralty has designated Her Majesty's Ship "Egeria" to survey a route for mail steamers and for a submarine cable between British Columbia and Australia. The work will occupy nearly three years. The route to be surveyed will be two hundred miles wide for the entire distance, from a point on the east coast of Australia via the extreme northern coast of New Zealand, thence of British Columbia, passing the Fiji Islands, and landing at Victoria, on the southern end of Vancouver Island. The distance is over seven thousand five hundred miles.

ADAM MORSE, the southern negro who fled to Toronto and whose extradition has been refused, has reason to be thankful that he selected Canada as a retreat from the human bloodhounds of the South. Morse's offence was that he thrashed a car conductor for abusing his (Morse's) boy. For a negro to raise his hand against a white man in the South is a serious crime, and means a long term in the "chain-gang," or in the mines. Those who have lived in the South and have seen exhibitions of the race prejudice of the whites, have alone an idea of the farce made of such a trial before a jury of whites.

The citizens of Winnipeg are murmuring at the expense of the public school system. This year the trustees are asking for \$70,000, and as the Provincial Government gave a grant of \$30,000, the total amount estimated to be spent on the city schools this year is \$100,000. The Winnipeg press complains that the citizens do not take sufficient interest in the election of school trustees and the control of this important branch of the public service is consequently left in the hands of a few persons. Winnipeg is not singular in this respect, there are many places in Ontario where the school taxes are felt to be burdensome.

The general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada met in Halifax on the 13th inst. According to the statistical returns, there are now in this body 1381 churches, supplied by 783 ministers, with a membership of 89,987. There are 112,940 Sabbath school scholars, taught by 12,976 teachers, and 183,471 volumes in their libraries. In 1887 the church had an income of \$1,772,000, of which \$788,000 was paid to ministers, whose average stipend was \$949 each. Towards home missions,

\$43,078 was subscribed and \$69,606 towards foreign missions. This is a creditable state of affairs.

THE time is probably at hand when the people of Canada will demand that all teachers of youth be total abstainers. Scandals open the question for discussion, but it is not scandals which do the great harm. The teacher who comes to the classroom maudlin and quarrelsome, may waste the children's time, but his example is not likely to attract them. There is no measure to the contentment in which such are held by the children. It is the man who, is quoted by them, as being very erroneously, as an evidence that it is no harm to drink, who is laying poison at the fountain head of many a young life. Such a one may live up to his theory and live respectably and long, but what a number of grassy graves can be counted of those who have sought to take example by his moderation and failed in an experiment in which not more than one in ten can be expected to succeed. If anyone doubts this, let him remember his schoolfellows and enquire where they are and what they are. A great deal is said about teaching temperance hygiene in the public schools, but, apart from the fact that non-abstainers will emasculate such teaching, the teaching of the life is infinitely greater power than the teaching of books. The next demand of the temperance movement should be that abstainers only as teachers in schools.
