**Editorial Notes.**

(By the Editor or gathered from Exchanges.)

ACCORDING to the official trade returns Ireland sent to Great Britain last year 669,253 cattle, 548,568 sheep and 1,698,741 pigs.

Mr. A. Blue, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, says that if no unfavorable conditions appear during the next two weeks all reasonable fear of a failure of crops will be over. The recent rain was very general, and there must have been millions in it for the country.

COMPARED with the countries of Europe the United States expends a very modest sum on Agriculture. The total agricultural appropriations asked of Congress for the coming year amount to a little over \$1,786,000. France, with a less rural population, expends annually \$8,000,000; Italy and Germany, each \$3,000,000; and Russia, with less land in cultivation, \$14,000,000.

FOURTEEN feet of water from Lake Superior to the sea is the near prospect offered by the completion of canal enlargements on the St. Lawrence. Fifty years ago there was not fourteen feet of water from Montreal to the sea. Taken collectively, our canal system is not a less gigantic work than the Canada Pacific Railway, and both are marvellous works for so young a nation.

Now that the law in New York has settled it that murderers must be killed by electricity instead of the rope, there seems to be considerable doubt as to whether the shock may not be as likely to prove fatal to the executioner as to the culprit. Several experts are hard at work upon the problem of devising an apparatus warranted not to kill the wrong man. There are hopes that the question will be satisfactorily settled before the date fixed for the first execution under the new law.

FAILURES in Canada have been more numerous during the half year which is just ended than during the same period of 1887, but the aggregate amount of liabilities shows a great decrease. The increase in number amounts to twenty-one per cent, but the average amount of liabilities has fallen from \$14,830 to \$8,948, or nearly four per cent. The failure of a banking institution or a couple of large wholesale firms will make all the difference in the average of liabilities so that not a great deal of reassurance is to be drawn from a drop in the average, and the increase in the number of failures shows the necessity for the continuance of that caution in business which has characterized trade as a rule so far this year.

THE County Council of Simcoe will refund the balance of County tax of 1887 after deducting Reeve's expenses and grants that may have been made during that year, and there will be no sale of non-resident lands in the District of Muskoka by the County Treasurer. Each municipality will have the power to sell their own non-resident lands which are in arrears of taxes. The County of Simcoe has treated Muskoka very generously. It remains to be seen what Victoria will do.—(Orillia Packet.)—If the "Packet" will consult the records of the County of Victoria it will find that the said county has always treated the Muskoka townships "generously," so much so, in fact, that it could not be wondered at that they objected to being separated. We do not know the custom in Simcoe but Victoria always gave them far more than she received and still the cry went up for more.

The arrival of the steel steamer Rosedale last Friday at Chicago on Chicago papers from London naturally excited a great deal of interest in mercantile circles, as it has proved the possibility of sending grain direct from the Liverpool docks to Liverpool without transshipment. The Rosedale left London on May 25th and consequently the passage occupied thirty-five days. The trip was 150 miles short of 5,000 miles. The Rosedale is the first propeller which has ever traversed the direct route from London to Chicago. She went from London to Montreal, through the Lachine canal, through Lake St. Louis on the Beauharnois canal, through to Lake St. Francis, thence to Kingston, then on to Port Dalhousie through the Welland Canal to Lake Erie, Detroit river, Lake St. Clair, the straits of Mackinaw, down Lake Michigan into the Chicago river.

SEVERAL years ago Queen Victoria was crowned Empress of India—a stroke of policy out of which the British Government expected important results. Whether these have been realized we cannot say; but it appears that her Majesty, who is sixty-nine years old, has suddenly thought best to take another step in the business of stirring the pulse of India's devotion to the crown. She has engaged a Hindoo prince at \$750 a month to teach her Hindustanee. Probably her next message to her beloved rice-eating subjects in the Orient will be couched in the language to which they are accustomed. How is Russia going to offset these philological and other moves of the British crown? It is proposed that the Czar be crowned at Samarcand in Central Asia, the present terminus of the Transcaspien Railroad. His new title is not revealed, probably it is not yet selected, but we presume it will express the fatherly care of the Emperor of all the Russias for his Tartar subjects in Asia. Perhaps the next step will be a plunge on his part into some of the Central Asian lands of the possession of Victoria. There is no doubt that the man who will be sent to watch the progress of these moves for actors and actresses is a man of early promise.
