Open Once More. The hotels have opened their sheds and places of business once more. A meeting was held on Tuesday evening in the Town Hall, called by the Reeve of Thorah to consider the situation as it then stood.

We were not present but learn that the meeting was of the unanimous opinion that the Scott Act is a complete humbug and not worthy of consideration; that the hotelkeepers of Beaverton have been badly treated and that greater rigour has been used against them than their fellows in the business in other places, all of which was traced to personal spite and enmity, etc. A number of speeches were made and the question of temperance and the Scott Act pretty generally reviewed, but what it will all amount to we are at a loss to know.

The reasons and arguments advanced on Tuesday are all very good and have often been heard before, but they are not going to prevent the same malicious individuals from prosecuting the violators of the law when opportunity presents itself if this is the reason of the prosecutions, and what can a thousand meetings of the character of Tuesday evening do in the matter. One thing is certain that so long as filthy insults such as that tendered to the Rev. Mr. McKee on Monday evening are concocted and perpetrated by the hotel party's friends, it cannot be expected that peace should exist, in fact it looks as though a direct challenge had been extended and it can hardly be wondered at if it be accepted in that light. It is also to be regretted that the hotelkeepers took the course of closing their houses and then turning to ridicule those who endeavoured to relieve the inconvenience caused by it and we question much whether the object in view has been obtained thereby. None can question the propriety of the hotels closing if they feel so inclined, but it is carrying a supposed prerogative too far to find letters of intimidation sent to parties who presume to furnish accommodation which the hotels had refused. This was done in one case and although we do not presume to say by the hotelkeepers it is undoubtedly supposed to be in their fore and has tactics have opened the eyes of many who care to see these institutions in the past that perhaps it openly intimated that they had grave possibility of this matter not ending here, but that it may finally end in bloodshed. We do not anticipate any such result and we hope such alarmist opinions may be at once suppressed. It is surely demoralizing enough to have the events of the past few weeks given to the world without announcing the fact that for a miserable glass of whiskey there is a possibility of some one being found vicious enough to cause bloodshed. However, the hotels are again open and travellers can again find accredited places of accommodation in Beaverton.

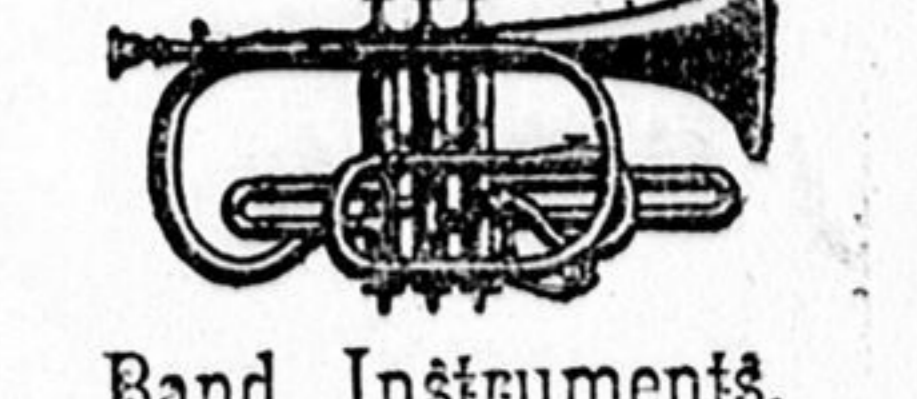
