

The Georgian Bay Lumber Co's storehouse and bathhouses were completely destroyed by fire on Tuesday of last week and the mill was saved only after a severe struggle. A dynamite explosion also occurred during the fire, injuring one man so badly that his arm was broken in three places.

A very sad affair took place at Cannington on Friday last, by which a young man named Wallace Kerr, son of Mr. Wm. Kerr, had his right arm torn off at the shoulder. The youth was employed at F. Bick & Sons' planing mill, and in putting a belt on a pulley, in some unexplained manner his arm got caught with the above terrible result. He was seventeen years of age.

Orillia's new Presbyterian Church will cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000.

Jas. Plaskett, of Whitby, owns a mare which foaled twins last year and again this spring. Four foals in thirteen months.

Libel suits are numerous. The Orillia "News-Letter," the Mitchell "Recorder" the Mitchell "Advocate" and the Brussels "Budget" all have one on hand and the Shelburne "Free Press" is threatened.

Two Buffalo anglers passed through Owen Sound the other day on their way home from Manitoulin Island, having with them over 2000 speckled trout caught in the waters on the island.

Cookstown cheese factory turned out over 14,000 pounds of cheese in June.

Newmarket firemen cleared \$300 by their Dominion Day celebration.

There are six dogs to the square rod around Hanover according to the local paper, and it recommends their immediate slaughter, owing to the large number of sheep killed from time to time.

\$1,000 reward is offered for the capture of C. C. Nelson, an absconding banker, from Atlanta, Ga.; he is wanted for embezzlement; swindling, perjury and larceny. He is supposed to be summing in this district.

A boy at Lindsay was rescued from drowning just as he was going down the second time.

Mr. P. Mitchell of Lindsay, has taken up his residence at Bracebridge, as deputy sheriff of the new county.

The 16th of August will be observed as a civic holiday in Bracebridge.

At Uxbridge 20 passed the entrance and 2 were recommended.

They haggled over the location of the band stand in Oshawa so long that the Council refused to have one built at all.

Mr. H. Gordon, of Port Perry, has given notice to the town council that he intends entering suit against the corporation for \$5,000 damage owing to the drowning of his son in a town tank. The council passed a motion sympathizing with the parents but stating that they do not deem the town liable for damages.

We understand there are three hundred mill men on strike and that the wages formerly earned by these men would average \$1.25 per day, aggregated \$375 per day; they have now been out 15 days, total loss so far, \$5,625, or at the rate of \$10,000 per month.—[Gravenhurst Banner.]
