### Profit By Experience.

The Pickering "News" refers to the late disastrous fire in the village of Ripley, as follows: "And now we are called on to acquaint our readers with the fact that another village has been licked up by a tongue of flame. The village of Ripley, Ont., is a thing of the past and the losses amount to about \$40,000. Twenty-six buildings were burned and only two or three business places remain. The people turned out with pails and fought the flames as best they could, but the flames could not be stayed. The village had no means of protection other than willing hands, borrowed pails and the usually insufficient supply of ladders. All these fires are so many warnings to this village and should decide our citizens upon backing up the committee appointed at a recent public meeting to prepare a scheme of protection for their consideration. When the next meeting is held all should turn out and see that some action is taken." "The remarks the 'News' applies to Pickering are also very applicable to Beaverton. In the past we have been extremely fortunate in escaping from fires but it is only too possible that under existing conditions we may arouse some time to the fact that the village is being destroyed and without power to prevent it.—Since the above was written a stern warning has come in the destruction of the Foundry.

# Fire Protection.

Now that the Foundry is in the hands of the people will again take up the fire protection and with one of the spasmodic gusts which usually follow an event of the above description something may possibly result from it. Nothing is more certain than had the wind on Wednesday night been from the south-west the whole of the business part of the village would have been swept away. As it was the huge cinders set fire to several places in the path and only by persistent effort on the part of the people armed with the indefatigable pail were they kept from doing great harm. Snellgrove Carriage Works we learn was fired twice from this source and had the sparks fallen among the rubbish which may be found in the rear of the stores, or on the roofs of the tinder boxes which adorn portions of Simcoe street nothing could have saved the place from complete annihilation. It is only a short time ago since we placed with the council an offer made to the town through this journal for an excellent second-hand fire engine which could have been secured cheap, but, no doubt so thoroughly impressed was that body with the security of the property of the place that even reference was not made to the offer. It is to be hoped that if nothing else results from the event of Wednesday night may stimulate the town to something definite in the matter of protection. Let us see to it at once that in the future we be not left to the mercy of so terrible an element as fire without some means of combating its work. This was one of the principal reasons pressed in favor of the incorporation of the village and with the exception of procuring a number of hooks and ladders we do not think the first move has been made towards a systematic way of dealing with fire.
