BROCKVILLE, July 30.—A most distressing drowning accident occurred here about 11.30 this morning, which resulted in the death of Emily and Edith, aged 18 and 12, daughters of Mrs. Hugel, of this place. It appears the young ladies were bathing at Sheriff Ratrick's residence, where the water is very shallow for some distance out and then it suddenly deepens. They had waded out some distance, and, not being aware of the water deepening, went too far and suddenly sank. Their cries were heard and two young men, who were some distance from the shore, immediately hastened to their assistance, but before they could reach them they had disappeared for ever. One of the young men immediately plunged down and brought Edith up, but was unable to raise Emily alone. A Mr. Griffith then went down and succeeded in bringing her up. Three doctors were immediately summoned and everything was done to restore life but without avail. When the news reached town, the greatest excitement prevailed, and hundreds flocked to the scene of the accident. The greatest sympathy is expressed on all sides for Mrs. Hugel, who is at present on a visit to Hamilton. The eldest girl was very pretty and had just finished her education.

SCUGOG BRIDGE TENDERS.

On July 23rd Wm. Trennam tendered at \$7,200. On July 24th Jas. Montgomery tendered at \$6,820. The following tenders were put in on July 25, D. McMillan \$9,990 J. V. Thompson \$9,800; J. V. Thompson \$7,495. On the 29th Thos. Deverell tendered at \$9,800.

On the 28th day of July the tender of Wm. Trennam, of the town of Peterboro, was accepted and an agreement entered into between the said Contractor and the corporation of the County of Ontario binding said Contractor to have the work completed according to the specifications, on or before October 1st, 1880. The sum of \$4,900 is to be paid when the material has been placed in a proper position on the said roadway.—Of course the Contractor is bound to furnish all the material. The Commissioners are not bound to accept of the work before Oct. 1st 1880 but the timber work must be done not later than July 1st and the gravel work not later than September 1st. The Contractor is further bound not to interrupt public travel in way of driving or riding for a longer period than two weeks during the construction of said work and that foot passengers will always be provided with a safe means of crossing.—Observer.
