A few days after another man calls representing himself as attorney for the company, and producing a bill of shipment demands immediate payment for the goods or a note for the same, which, if not complied with endeavors to frighten his victim into payment by threats of legal proceedings.

PROF. TORRANCE of Woodstock, who in company with his wife and family went to Bobcaygeon last week for the good of his health, died very suddenly on Wednesday. His remains passed through Lindsay en route for Woodstock yesterday.—*Post*. The deceased gentleman is well known to a number of our readers, he having taught at Black's School, Mariposa, for a long time. He was also pastor of the Baptist congregation which for some years assembled in the present Methodist church in this village. At the time of his demise he occupied a Professor's chair in the Baptist college, Woodstock, and was to have been elevated to the Principalship of the new institution in Toronto on its being opened. Mr. Torrance was purely a self-educated man, and his indefatigable industry raised him to a position highly honorable and distinguished.
